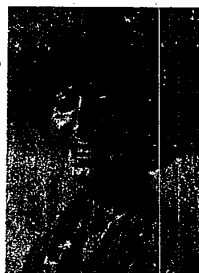


Shaw-Zimmerman

Jewish-Catholic Day is slated for March 8

Dr. Michael Novak will be the guest speaker at the Fourth Annual Jewish-Catholic Day on Thursday, March 8 at Madonna College in Livonia.

Sponsored by the League of Catholic Women of Detroit and the League of Jewish Women of Detroit, the event will feature a noon "petite luncheon" followed by an address by the noted columnist, philosopher, theologian and educator.

Mrs. Esther Rosenblum of Southfield is president of the League of Jewish Women, the umbrella organization for all the Jewish women's groups in metropolitan Detroit.

The League of Catholic Women is the oldest social service organization in Detroit. It operates five social service agencies in Detroit and four Bargain Counter resale shops in the tri-county area. Marilyn Lundy of Grosse Pointe is president.

Mrs. Sander Klein of Southfield and Mrs. Gerald Galtorn of Grosse Pointe are co-chairpersons of the traditional day.

The purpose of Jewish-Catholic Day according to Mrs. Lundy, is "to foster comradery among Jewish and Catholic women involved in community service, and to present a good program of interest to both groups."

Dr. Novak, who speaks to the importance of the human spirit and the family in man's relation to government and other forces will discuss "The Family - Out of Favor?"

The current Adjunct Professor at the American Enterprise Institute in Washington, D.C., Dr. Novak formerly taught at Harvard, Stanford, Old Westbury and Syracuse Universities and served as Associate Director for Humanities at the Rockefeller Foundation.

He is the author of 10 philosophical

works and two novels, and serves as an associate editor and contributor to several religious and secular journals.

Dr. Novak has worked as a journalist and teacher in Mexico and Italy, and has covered the political campaigns as well as human interest concerns across the country. His column appears in a daily newspaper locally.

Auxiliary Bishop Joseph Imesch of the Catholic Archdiocese of Detroit will deliver the invocation and Rabbi Ephraim Spectre of Adat Shalom Synagogue will offer the benediction.

The Merciaires, the 19-member choir group from Our Lady of Mercy High School in Farmington will perform during the luncheon. Miles Jaffe of the Jewish Welfare Federation will introduce the guest speaker.

UHS Auxiliary sets awards

The Woman's Auxiliary of the United Hebrew Schools (UHS) is offering awards to students in the elementary and high school levels of UHS. The awards are also available to UHS High School and Midrahs students and Midrahs graduates.

Intended as encouragement for further Judaic and Hebrew studies, the awards are not based on financial need. They are offered for Jewish summer camp experiences, study trips to Israel and for professional development in the field of Jewish education or Jewish communal service.

On the UHS elementary school level, students in lower grade are eligible for a \$100 awards towards Camp Kfar

Ivri, the Hebrew speaking village at Camp Tamarack in Ortonville. Students who attend the accelerated four-day program are eligible for \$125 for Camp Kfar Ivri or other approved Hebrew camps.

UHS high school students attending the seven week program are eligible for a \$150 award per year of attendance for a Jewish summer camp or study tour program in Israel.

The Esther Berman Graduate Award is also available toward tuition for Hebrew or Judaic studies at an accredited university in Israel.

Vital women: for tuning the mind and the body

Vital Woman, a two day health spa to help women get in tune with their body and mind will come to Mercy Center Friday and Saturday, Feb. 23-24.

A 6 p.m. dinner Friday begins the regime of swimming, dancing, exercise to music, Yoga and nutrition and diet sessions.

Fee is \$35 which includes overnight accommodations in the center at 28600 Eleven Mile.

"We are not promoting a pill or magic protein formula," say co-founders and instructors Denna Hawthorne and Joan Thornton. "We are promoting quality of life, joy of living and self awareness."

They do this through fitness of mind and body.

The cardiovascular aspect of Vital Woman is addressed through aerobic programs—walking, jogging or running. Calisthenics is covered through a "modern movement" program, having to do with free expression, muscle endurance and flexibility.

Or, the option of Yoga. The two women advocate yoga for releasing the mind to become more aware of the body, as well as for relaxation.

THE NUTRITIONAL program is described as "one of common sense with a gourmet touch."

Mrs. Hawthorne is director of the YMCA-sponsored fitness camps for women. She is a former dance instructor, certified nutrition workshop instructor, a certified YMCA physical fitness specialist and a marathon runner.

Ms. Thornton is a co-director of YMCA fitness camps for women and is a specialist in aquatic and water safety. She is a former dance and exercise teacher for the Y and is a long-distance runner.

Women who join Vital Woman in February are asked to bring comfortable loose clothing, an exercise mat or rug, good shoes to walk, jog or run in, a bathing suit, towels, sleeping bag and toiletries.

Vital Woman's next trip back to Farmington Hills will be on the weekend of May 4-5.

The two instructors will direct YMCA's Women's Fitness Camp, in Holy, the week of June 24-29.
