Next Wonderful Wednesday is workshop on ultra-suede

Minnie Vantrease brings her sewing expertise to Farmington Community Center Wednesday, Oct. 31, in continuation of the Wonderful Wednesday series. "Ultra-Suede" Workshop" runs from 9:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. Mrs. Vantrease, who is a noted seamstress and an authority on tailoring in the Detroit area, says, "Participants in my workshops can expect to get a feel for the fabric. They will lose any apprehension about tackling this luxury material, and

will get professional results with any project they have in mind using ultra-suede." Sewing with ultra-suede utilizes somewhat the same technique as is used when sewing leather. No glue is used, but there are a few accessory tools she advocates using. "It's different," she says, "but very easily learned." During the workshop participants will complete an eye glass case, and take home samples together, put in but-

tonholes, put on collars and cuffs, and put in zippers. Mrs. Vantrease is a resident of Royal Oak and a vocational teacher with a degree in home economics. She has taught in the Troy Adult Education Department, for senior citizens' organizations, has lectured for the Bloomfield Hills Village Women's Club and has conducted workshops throughout the metropolitan area. She has a background of teaching all levels of

tailoring, sewing, quilting and knitting for the past 25 years. Ultra-Suede Workshop is one of the few sessions in the Wonderful Wednesday series that has limited participation so individual attention can be given by the workshop leader. It is also one of the few workshops in the series which demands that participants bring their own bag lunch. Fee is \$12, plus materials.

Mrs. Vantrease's workshop is followed by Pat Bordman's Salmagundi Toy Workshop on Nov. 7. "Cookies Around the World," led by Barbara Dermody and Judy Antis, is scheduled for Nov. 14. The series closes on Nov. 28 when Marion Westberg teaches how to make pine cone wreaths on wire. Registrations are taken for all remaining sessions in the series by calling the center, 477-8404.
