Burn and scald dangers exist wherever there are matches, stowes, steam radiators and hot water — which means that every home is a potential deathtrap for children If they are not properly supervised and If safety pre-cautions are ignored.

To help parents give maximum pro-

To help parents give maximum protection against burns, the Combined Insurance Safety researchers offer the following suggestions:

Keep matches out of the reach of children and try to make sure they un-derstand that these are potentially dan-gerous articles, not toys.
 Never store anything such as cook-ies or other snack items anywhere near the stove, so that if a child decides to make an unauthorized search into a cupboard between meals, dangers har-bored by a stove in operation are min-imized.

• Place pots on back burners when ever possible, otherwise position them so the handles do not protrude over the edge. Keep oven doors closed.

• Never leave a small child in the kitchen alone for any reason or any period of time no matter how short the time may be.

• If a child must be in the kitchen while you are cooking or serving a meal, place the child in a playpen or high chair a safe distance from the stove. Never allow a child to toddle or crawl under your feet.
