

Kitchen spills hurt children

For those who heed the age-old admonition that a watched pot never boils — danger may lurk.

In truth, safety experts maintain, it's the unwatched pot that DOES boil that causes injury or death — principally to

small children.

The Department of Safety and Research of the Combined Insurance Company of America urges constant vigilance in the kitchen — as well as other parts of the house — to prevent

fatal, disfiguring and painful burns, of which children especially are likely to be victims.

The Harvard Medical School Health Letter reports that several studies have found most serious burn injuries in small children occur from scalds, mainly in the kitchen. Bathrooms were also found to be a significant source of scalds, either because small children had turned on faucets when their parents' backs were turned, or because the water had not been properly tested before baths were given.

Burn and scald dangers exist wherever there are matches, stoves, steam radiators and hot water — which means that every home is a potential deathtrap for children if they are not properly supervised and if safety precautions are ignored.

To help parents give maximum protection against burns, the Combined Insurance Safety researchers offer the following suggestions:

- Keep matches out of the reach of children and try to make sure they understand that these are potentially dangerous articles, not toys.
- Never store anything such as cookies or other snack items anywhere near the stove, so that if a child decides to make an unauthorized search into a cupboard between meals, dangers harbored by a stove in operation are minimized.
- Place pots on back burners whenever possible; otherwise position them so the handles do not protrude over the edge. Keep oven doors closed.
- Never leave a small child in the kitchen alone for any reason or any period of time no matter how short the time may be.
- If a child must be in the kitchen while you are cooking or serving a meal, place the child in a playpen or high chair a safe distance from the stove. Never allow a child to toddle or crawl under your feet.

Combining arts, crafts

A two-day exhibit and sale of arts and crafts developed because Louise Wilson of Rosedale Park needed a market for her work.

Among those whose work is particularly unusual are three leaded glass artists, Ken and Sharon Pellor of Redford, glass etchers, basket weavers, tape painters, folk art painters, Diane Waller of Farmington Hills, doll maker Terry Harris — who does period dolls with porcelain heads, calligrapher Diane Linn of Wayne State University and jeweler Jim and Cindy Pierson.

Two craftsmen who work in pewter will be featured, Dee Segula of Orchard Lake combines pewter and wood. John Groat of Plymouth is a master pewter craftsman who seldom shows his work.

Birmingham will be represented by Yvonne Ham, who does creative machine stitching. Lazo Steiner will be exhibiting and selling stoneware, and Farmington Hills painter and framer Ronald Perry will have a booth in the show.

PORTRAIT ARTIST Herbert Bailey will make his first appearance at this show doing on-the-spot pastel and charcoal portraits.

Other things in the show will be callco doorstops and figures, gold and silver jewelry, macramé, handmade purses and leather.

Because this show has grown in both scope and popularity, many of these same artists will be featured in a one-day show Nov. 7 at Lutheran High West, 8181 Greenfield, Detroit. Hours for this one are 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The Rosedale Park Community House is at 1945 Scarsdale, Detroit. Scarsdale is a short street between McNichols and Fenkell, four blocks east of the Southfield Freeway. Nominal admission charge.

Minutes of the June 15, June 25 and September 10, 1979 were approved.
Council enacted Amended Ordinance C10-75-1 (Employee Retirement System) Section 4.230, service credit.
Show cause hearing on demolition of building at 21411 Jefferson, was adjourned until November 19, 1979.
