

# Library programs include dinosaurs

The Farmington Community Library will offer many children's programs in October and November to delight all ages. Several programs will be open to elementary or preschool age groups who can attend without having to register.

At the Farmington branch, preschoolers can attend "Puppet Parade" with their parents from 10:30-11 a.m. on Nov. 9 and "Vive La France" for French stories from 2-3 p.m. on Nov. 17. For elementary ages at the Farmington branch, "The Sesu Film Festival" will be shown from 2-3 p.m. Nov. 17. Kindergarten children can attend preschool programs at the library. At the Farmington Hills branch on 12 Mile, preschoolers and kindergarten

students are invited to "Grin and Bear It" from 2-3:30 p.m. Nov. 5 and "Sometimes It's Turkey" from 10:30-11 a.m. on Nov. 15. Take along a pine cone and pipecleaners to this program.

Elementary school students can attend "Ghoules and Ghosties and Things that Go Bump in the Night" from 2-3 p.m. on Oct. 27, "Fun with Mr. Magoo" from 2-3 p.m. Nov. 10, and "A Flick and a Print" from 2-3 p.m. Nov. 24 for a Thanksgiving vacation movie and craft.

REGISTRATION is required for many programs with limited attendance. The next registration for the five-week session of programs begins on Oct. 26. Registration between 9-11

a.m. on that day must be made in person by a parent. After that period, registration may be accomplished either in person or on the telephone. Children may register for only one program in an effort to be fair to all. Residents of Farmington and Farmington Hills will be given first preference, with a waiting list provided for others. Age requirements are absolutely firm on the programs due to their format and high demand.

Registration-required programs for varied ages of preschoolers at the Farmington branch include: "Learning to Play, Playing to Learn" from 2-3 p.m. Thursdays, Nov. 15 to Dec. 13; which is open to 2- and 3-year-olds accompanied by a parent; "Berenstein

Bears Bonanza" from 9:30-10 a.m. on one of the following Thursdays: Nov. 15, Nov. 29, Dec. 13; and is open to 3-, 4- and 5-year-olds; "Mother Hubbard's Cupboard" from 2-2:30 p.m. on Wednesdays for 3- and 4-year-olds and from 9:30-10 a.m. on Tuesdays for 4- and 5-year-olds; "Storpbour Journey" from 9:30-10 a.m. on Wednesdays for 4- and 5-year-olds; "Science for Tots" from 9:30-10 a.m. on Mondays for 3- and 4-year-olds and "Start with Art" from 2-2:30 p.m. on Mondays for 4- and 5-year-olds.

FIRST and second graders at the Farmington branch can attend "Back to Nature" from 4-4:45 p.m. on Tuesdays. "In Search of Dinosaurs" is for third and fourth graders from 4-5 p.m. on Wednesdays. Fifth and sixth graders can join "Readers Roundtable" which meets on the second Tuesday of each month or they can join "T-Shirt Design" from 4-5 p.m. Dec. 3 or Dec. 10.

At the Farmington Hills branch, preschoolers and kindergartners can choose from the following: "The Shape of Me" from 10:30 until 11:45 a.m. on Wednesdays for two and three-year-olds; "Berenstein Bears Bonanza" available on one of the following Wednesdays: Nov. 14, Nov. 28 or Dec. 12 for three, four and five-year-olds; "Mother Hubbard's Cupboard" from 10:30 - 11 a.m. on Mondays for three, four and five-year-olds or from 2 - 2:30 p.m. on Tuesdays for three and four-year-olds; "Holiday Treats" from 2-2:45 p.m. on Thursdays for four and five-year-olds; and "Rainbow of Story Treasures" from 10:30 11 a.m. on Tuesdays for ages four and five.

Elementary age programs at the Farmington Hills branch include: "Creative Dramatics" from 4-5 p.m. on Mondays for first and second grade students; "Crazy Concoctions" from 4-5 p.m. on Wednesdays for third and fourth graders. Fifth and sixth graders can join "Readers Roundtable" which meets the first and third Thursdays for the month.

FIFTH and sixth grade students can choose from some other programs if they don't participate in the roundtable. Those programs include: "Around the World in Crafts" from 4-5 p.m. on Tuesdays.

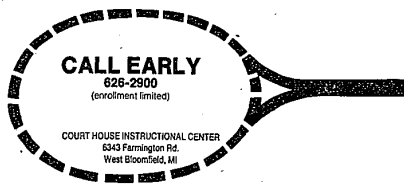

## BLACKJACK INSTRUCTION

Blackjack is the most popular of all casino games. It offers the expert player the best odds available and it is the only casino game that can be beaten from a mathematical standpoint.

Blackjack can be divided into two categories. Basic Strategy (expert play) and card counting. Card counting is a strategy based on the Theory of Probabilities that when played accurately, actually gives the player an advantage over the casino.

Instruction in these two areas are as follows:

1. **BASIC STRATEGY.** Most people who play casino Blackjack think that they are expert players. The fact is that not one in a hundred knows the correct play for every decision in Blackjack. For example, with a hand of A7 you should stand when the dealer's up-card is a 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7 or 8. Take a hit card against the dealer's 9 or 10, and double down when the dealer shows a 3, 4, 5, or 6. The correct way to play each hand for hitting, standing, doubling, and pair splitting is a product of computer technology and its accuracy has been verified by the computer banks of IBM Corporation, Sperry Rand, and the Jet Propulsion Laboratory. If you do not play each hand correctly, you are simply giving your money away to the casino.

The Basic Strategy class is one hour per week for 3 weeks and the cost is \$50.

2. **BASIC STRATEGY AND AN INTRODUCTION TO CARD COUNTING.** Same as No. 1 except you will also learn the Blackney Add & Estimate Strategy. This simple count is easy to learn and very easy to play in the casinos. This class is one hour per week for 6 weeks and the cost is \$90.

3. **THE BLACKNEY SIMPLE HI-LOW STRATEGY.** The Basic Strategy class is a prerequisite to taking this class. My Hi-Low Strategy assigns point values to various card ranks and is extremely effective for the single and double deck games. This class is one hour per week for 6 weeks and the cost is \$120.

Arrangements can also be made for private consultation for those who do not wish to attend a class session. The cost for a one hour appointment is \$40.
