

To Ballot On County Charter, Commission

Wayne County voters, who nominated candidates for the new 26-member County Board of Supervisors in the Aug. 6 primary election, will ballot on nominees for another new county body—a charter commission—in the Nov. 5 general election.

Partisan nomination of two charter commission candidates from each of 35 districts will be on the ballot in tandem with a question asking the voters if they wish to establish a county home rule charter.

tion was put on the ballot by the County Board of Supervisors to evaluate the Michigan County Home Rule Act of 1966 to determine whether home rule could improve Wayne County government.

The Committee of 99 concluded that significant improvements are possible under the state home rule act, and recommended that the Board of Supervisors put the home rule question before the voters "as soon as practicable."

HOME RULE WOULD give the voters of Wayne County greater latitude than they have now to determine the structure and functions of their county government, within the limits of the state home rule act. At present, virtually all aspects of county government are determined by the State Legislature.

Adoption of county home rule would have no effect on local governments within the county. Under the home rule act, the charter could establish a legislative body (county commission) of five to 35 members elected from equal population districts on partisan basis. The home rule act also provides for an elected county executive, a county mayor, a post that does not exist at present. Under the act, according to the Committee of 99, would also give the county greater latitude in service arrangements with local communities and in retaining what was described as a "maze" of county boards and commissions.

The 35 districts for the charter commission were drawn by the same special five-member Apportionment Commission which drew the districts for the 26-district Board of Supervisors, which will be elected Nov. 5 and take office Jan. 1.

The Apportionment Commission consisted of three elected county officials—the Clerk, Prosecuting Attorney and Treasurer—and the county chairmen of the Democratic and Republican parties.

The commission adopted the 35-district plan for the charter commission at the suggestion of the present Board of Supervisors. Members of the county board from outside Detroit came up with the plan after expressing disappointment with the commission's 26-district plan for the new Board of Supervisors.

DEARBORN -- Congresswoman Martha W. Griffiths will address University of Michigan candidates for the master of business administration degree in Dearborn on Aug. 24.

Mrs. Griffiths will appear before the new degree candidates at a luncheon at the University's Fair Lane Conference Center. It was announced by Floyd A. Bond, dean of the U-M Graduate School of Business Administration.

The students are enrolled in the School's MBA evening program, offered on the U-M's Dearborn and Flint campuses. The program enrolled more than 325 students last year—all of them employed full time.

Mrs. Griffiths, of Detroit, has represented Michigan's 17th Congressional District since 1954. She was appointed to the Joint Economic Committee in 1961 and now is chairman of the committee's subcommittee on fiscal policy. She was elected to the House Ways and Means Committee in 1962.

Congresswoman Griffiths served in the Michigan State Legislature from 1948 to 1952. She was judge and recorder of the Recorder's Court of Detroit in 1953.

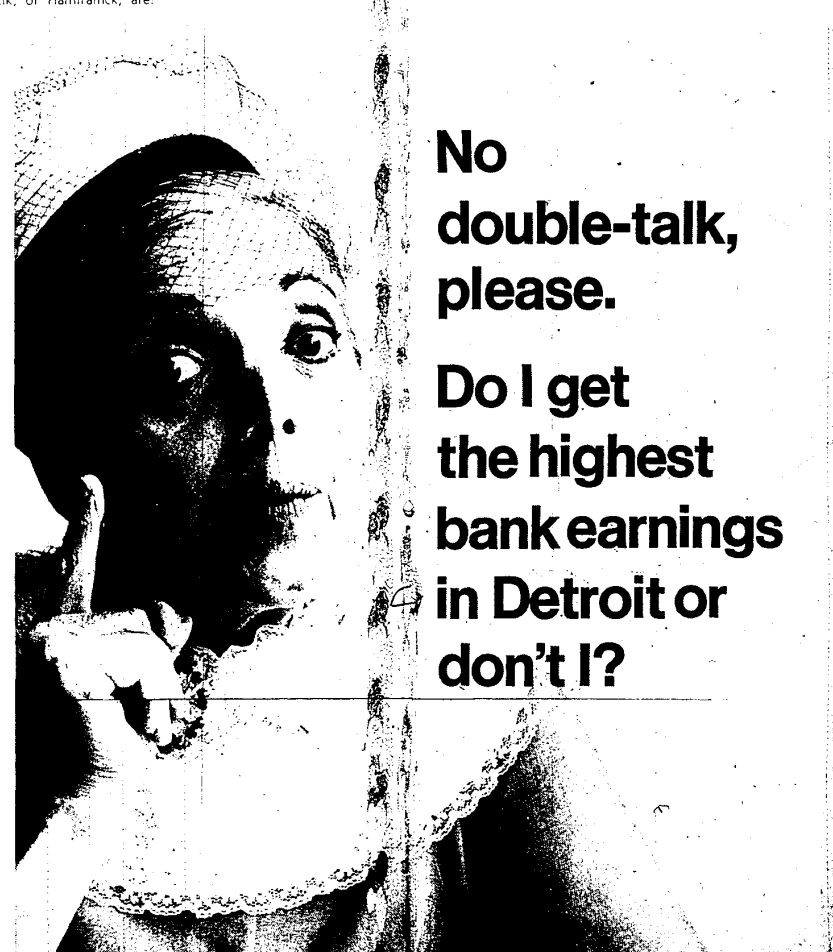
