Family, Theater, Career Fill Her Busy Life

She and community theater immediately formed a mutual admiration society. Before long Louise had served the Guild as secretary and president as well as playing in several of its productions.

"I didn't know I was a comedienne," she said. "But playing the mother in 'Barefoot in the Park' two years ago made me realize how much I enjoy that kind of acting."

She said she really loves all sorts of mother roles.

"But I can't seem to play a Jewish mother," Louise added. "I'm sure I have the understanding of her feelings, but I can't get the dialect to my own satisfaction."

"Getting well into a role is one of the things I like best

about the theater. You have to work hard to know the person you're playing—how she sees the world, what she thinks. That's what acting is about."

PROBABLY her favorite role is that of Stella in "A Streetcar Named Desire," which she did for the Wyandotte Players in 1965 and the Dearborn Players the following year.

Her most recent appearance was as the proprietor of a house of prostitution in the University of Detroit theater's "Everything in the Garden."

"The theaterists tend to call me when they have a part for a mother," she said. "This time they thought of me when they had a part for a madame—not too different."

Her own acting plus her husband's and son's backstage work with the Livonia-Redford Guild have made Louise a big booster of community theater in general.

"It's wonderful for the members because everyone interested can take part," she said. "There are no limits as to age or occupation. And it's great for the community—it's too bad for people to feel they have to go outside their own area for entertainment when there is so much that's good close to home."

Lamaze Series Schedules Final Lecture

Dr. Irwin Chabon of New York City will be the last of three speakers in a series on the Lamaze method of childbirth.

He will speak Thursday, Nov. 20, at 8 p.m. in the Rackham Auditorium in Ann Arbor and Friday, Nov. 21, at 8 p.m. in the Rackham Auditorium in Detroit.

His topic will be "The Psychoprophylactic Method of Childbirth as It Is Taught and Used in the United States."

The two lectures are sponsored by the Childbirth Preparation Association, the Childbirth Information Service of the University of Michigan Center for Adult Educators and the Continuing Education Department of the Ann Arbor Public Schools.

DR. CHABON, a practicing obstetrician and gynecologist, was born in Brooklyn and is a graduate of the University of Illinois and the State University of New York College of Medicine.

He currently is on the staff of the Roosevelt Hospital and the New York Medical College. His writings include a book, "Make and Aware: Participating in Childbirth through Psychoprophylaxis."
