

World travelers share China adventure at community center benefit

World travelers Harold and Frances Gibson will share their travel adventure in China during a benefit evening planned for Farmington Community Center.

"A Tourist's Look at China" begins with wine at 6 p.m., followed by an authentic Chinese dinner. A discussion with the Gibsons will follow. The event is set for Saturday, Nov. 10 in the center, 24705 Farmington Rd.

The Gibsons will use slides to share their impressions of the society closed to the western eye for many years; streets jammed with people using pishon, pony and pedal powered vehicles; homes of the Shanghai factory workers; the ancient resort city of Hangchow; the palaces and pandas of Peking; and the Great Wall of China.

The Gibsons' 11-day trip in December, preceded the resumption of U.S. and Chinese diplomatic relations by only a few days. The couple were among the first several thousand American visitors to receive visas. The Chinese International Travel Service kept the travelers busy for as many as 14 hours a day. They visited schools, the opera, small factories, ancient Chinese structures and Chairman Mao's Memorial.

"We were never restricted," Gibson said. "We went everywhere and could ask any questions and speak to anyone who could speak our language, or understand what we were asking." He believes "a superb organizational job" has been accomplished in China.

"Every house has a radio to bring the people what the government wants them to hear, and 80 percent of the people live in 20,000 agricultural communities, largely self governed and self sufficient with only production goals set by the government," he said.

He described the educational system as offering "a way out and up. It is, however, structured only for the advancement of superior students. The graduate is channeled into the job where he or she is needed."

Low price tags put on high quality art

Because working artists cannot possibly keep everything they draw or paint, the Farmington Artists Club offers a budget art section in its fall and spring exhibits.

"They must sell in order to buy supplies and keep on painting," said Audrey DiMarco, chairwoman of this fall's exhibit. "The prices of some of these pieces is staggering."

All unframed, the pieces that are placed in the budget art section of the exhibit begin at \$1.

Last spring the club provided its show-goers with about 2,000 quality paintings to choose from in this section, and Mrs. DiMarco expects the same number at the fall show.

The Farmington Artists Club fall exhibit and show runs from Friday through Sunday, Nov. 16-18, in Mercy Center, on 11 Mile Road, east of Middlebelt. Show hours are from 10 a.m. to 9 p.m. Friday and Saturday, and noon to 5 p.m. Sunday. Admission is free. Refreshments are complimentary.

"The budget section might include the perfect line drawing for Aunt Kitty's Christmas gift, or a watercolor for dad, or an oil painting to fill that empty foyer wall."

"The pieces go quickly, and it's first-come, first-served," the chairwoman said.

Mrs. DiMarco follows the show and sale traditions of the past, with the juried gallery, the open gallery, as well as the budget art section.

Another tradition is asking the guests to vote for a favorite painting in the show.

Mrs. DiMarco, a continual winner of awards for her art, joins other members of the club by placing a number of her paintings in the show.

Her most recent award was given for an oil painting called "Personalities," given by the Palette and Brush Club,

She works in all media but says her first love is working in oils, and she works on 10 to 15 paintings at a time.

"If I don't have a lot of things going on at one time, the excitement isn't there," she said, "and there are always a lot of exciting things happening within the Farmington Artists Club."

Mrs. DiMarco has studied at Center for Creative Studies and Eastern Michigan University, and is now working with Johanna Haas in Birmingham-Bloomfield Art Association.

She teaches painting in Bently High School in Livonia, and most recently was asked to jury the Plymouth Art Club's show.

Amendatory Zoning Ordinance C62-T-2

Section 1.
Article XA, Section 1003A, Paragraphs 4a and 4b, Ordinance No. C62, Zoning Ordinance, of the City of Farmington Hills, as amended, are hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 1003A Required Conditions:
4. All uses shall receive site plan review and approval by the Planning Commission prior to the issuance of a building permit for construction of the proposed use. The existing conditions map and site plan shall be submitted in accordance with Section 1918 and at the scale of not less than one inch = 40 feet.
a. Existing conditions map shall indicate the following:
Subparagraphs 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6.
b. Site plans shall indicate the following:
Subparagraphs 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7 and 8
