

McGuire always ready to expound on basketball

There are people who will stretch the truth in order to be tactful. Then there is Al McGuire.

McGuire has never been accused of being tactful, but he has been described as colorful.

It's no cliché to say that the Pled Piper of New York is a man of many different things to many different people. He was at the Hyatt Regency Hotel Tuesday, giving his views at a U-D fundraiser.

McGuire is drawing rave reviews as a color commentator on NBC's college basketball coverage. This follows a stint as head basketball coach at Marquette University which safely can be

termed "successful."

McGuire is known as a fiery personality. His views had a message for players and fans. He talked about Pete Arthel's book, "The City Game."

"When we recruit, the main thing we look for is something we call control. There are players who are quick. But you have to have control, McGuire.

"It's an overall sense of what's happening on the court. You have to know what to do with your quickness. You have to know how to move without the ball. During a game, a player spends over 20 minutes moving without the ball."

"One of the players that I recruited here in Detroit was Terry Tyler (now on the Pistons). He had what you look for. He was a good kid with a good atti-

tude, someone we called a "noselbeeder." He could really get up there on the backboards," McGuire said.

"We visited him whenever I was in town. But he stayed here," he added. McGuire expounded his views on the differences between city and suburban games. He is fond of saying "He's a typical white player. He's slow and he can't jump."

No offense intended, McGuire explained. "Basketball started out being a black man's game. It became a black man's game when the NBA put the (24 second) clock in over 20 years ago. That changed the game," he said.

"I changed from give-and-go and box-out, to running up and down the court and shooting. That fits the playground style more. I truly believe, as Arthel says, that outside of Indiana,

basketball is a city game.

"I used to think that the way to defend a black kid would be to zone him and a white kid to press him man-to-man. Now, I don't know," he said. "There's a lot of quality coaches going into the inner-city these days, so you're getting all kinds of coaching at all the different levels."

"But on the playgrounds, you're playing 355 games a year. Out at these smaller schools outside of the city, once basketball season is through, they need you for the basketball team. Once, basketball's through, they need you for football or track or so on."

"These summer camps are a good thing for the kids, though. They get a lot of competition there."

The entire nation wept with McGuire when he capped off his illustrious

coaching career by winning the 1977 national championship.

If U-D wanted someone to talk about success, they found a man who has it as his middle name.

"The last three years, U-D has really come, so to speak, out of the wood," said McGuire. They've almost turned the corner a couple of times, but something stopped them, tripped them up each time.

"You need a couple classy players, and some local support. It's a long road. U-D has some good players, (Dave Niles, (Hilt) McCormick. They've made great strides," he said. Niles is a graduate of Garden City West.

"When I tried to sell a player on Marquette, one of the things I emphasized was that Milwaukee is an NBA city,"

McGuire continued. "They'd be getting NBA exposure. A kid like that, that impresses him. It's important to have that NBA, big city exposure."

"Another thing was, hey, basketball is a team sport here at Marquette, basketball is a team sport at U-D. Here, the students wait for the basketball season to start. It isn't just another sport."

McGuire stated that for now he is very happy in the announcing booth. His role as a celebrity helped him raise a tidy sum in a charity run. In fact, the old coach donated \$17,000 of his own money.

McGuire was asked if there were other special things a coach looked for in a player. "Well," he summed up laughing. "You have to be able to dribble and shoot. That helps."

In The Rocket

The sharp shooting bowlers in the Detroit area got a real surprise this week when the American Bowling Congress released the high scores rolled so far this season across the nation.

They have grown accustomed to having scores no higher than 3,300 — and very few of them.

But on the ABC list, the high team score thus far is a 3,757 rolled by the Sports Palace team in San Antonio, Tex. What's more surprising is the fact that two other teams — one in St. Louis and another in Cleveland — also have bettered 3,700.

It is the same in the other categories. The high team game so far is a 1,350 rolled by a team in Paramus, N.J. In the individual three-game series the high man is Dennis Pate of Texas, with 888, one pin more than two other

bowlers. The most interesting score came in the doubles where a team from Whittier, Calif., rolled 597. That is just three pins short of two 300 games. That score possibly will never be beaten.

ONLY TWO 700 series were bowled this week, which is quite unusual. One of them was a surprise as it was rolled by Bob Crawford at Country Lanes. He opened with a 265, followed with 205 and closed with 230 for 715.

His nearest rival was Stan Wright who had a 255 in 679. In the mixed doubles, John Lomik was high with 666.

The other 700 series was the work of Jay Dishingon in the Wonderful Classic. After starting with a 192 he came back with games of 258 and 256 for 706. Next to him for the night came

Tony Thiurge with a 258 in 685. Two teams bettered 3,100. Larry Hay's Haymakers rolled 3,148 and Mark Hammond's team followed with a 3,131.

In the ladies senior house league Carol Westcott was high with a closing 233 in 654. Others in line included Chris Fischer with 608, Dorothy Parnace with 602 and Darlene Marrow with 600.

AT WESTLAND BOWL, Jane Martin showed the way in the ladies classic with a 593 that included a 243 game. Tied for the next place were Carol Hochstein and Bobbi Farkas each of whom posted a 576.

High man for the week in the house was Rick Stary with a 673 that included games of 267 and 235.

THE LADIES were on a scoring spree at Garden Lanes.

Mae Lackey showed the way in the classic with a 268 in 658 and Vivian Williamson paced the classic with 593. In the Moose circuit Larry Matallat was top man with 617, while Don Hangman had a 244 in 599.

WARREN TODD had one of his better nights in the Ford League at Woodland Lanes as he came through with a

265 in 638 to take top honors. His nearest rival was Steve Hlasczki with a 234 in 618.

In the junior house league Gary Swathell was top man with 622 and Rob Hill was next with 583. In the Keglerettes, Chys Zogoratos, with a 120 average, rolled a 466.

Joy Coyle was high with a 591 and Penny O'Connell, with a 115 average, bested her first 200 series.

LOU ESCH went 117 pins over his average when he found the range for a 549 series at Plymouth Bowl. Allston White went 85 over with a 493. Others who rolled well included Nick Lopes, Clarence Mongpan, Erwin Otfemman and Enoch Wacker, each of whom were well over their averages.

VIC PILSR had a big middle game of 255 that helped him post a 692 to pace the Canton Classic at the Super Bowl. Dave Knotts followed him with a 235 in 617.

IN OTHER GOOD PERFORMANCE, John Lomik had a 224 in 666 at the Super Bowl and Peter Lind was high man in the Livonia Municipal league at Merril-Bowl with a 276.

One of the week's features was a 647 series that included a 289 game, rolled by 14-year-old Gary Bechard at Mayflower Lanes.

After bowling 237 and 234 Larry Thompson dropped to 224 in the Bel-Aire Classic and missed a 700 series by five pins. It was the same with Gary Hodge. After posting 246 and 215 he came up with a 183 final and had to settle for a 644.
