So how an traffic deaths be further reduced?
"Any great reductions are going to come gradually," one of the deans of the traffic safety movement told an Okaladio Subselhe, retirred director of the Highway Traffic Safety Center at Michigan State University, traced the history of the movement at the annual meeting luncheon of the Traffic Improvement Association of Oakland County,
Sheehe sold the invitation of TIA executive director Bruce Madsen, his first student at the MSU center 25 years ago.

DESPITE PROGRESS — the public no longer rates traffic safety as a major concern — Sheehe said the toll in Oakland County last year was 179, with 2,000 being killed statewide and some 51,000 in the nation.

"The goal in Michigan should be to reduce deaths to 1,000 a year," said Sheehe. "A driver can normally go 100,000 miles without being involved in a traffic accident. Your job, ladies and gentlemen, will be to increase that figure to 200,000 in the next 10 years."

How? Sheehe had two essential answers.

What is been been to the sergeant, "he said, clining selective traffic enforcement programs (STEP) across the country. Some produced results, some didn't. The only detectable difference appeared to be whether a sergeant was motivated and able to motivate his officers.

"The key is the driver," he added. While it's possible the nation may have reached a plateau in improving the traffic environment, much remains to be done in persuading drivers to be more alert.
"Safety education has gotton short

"Safety education has gotton short shrift in federal funding," Sheehe said, adding: "I wish we could find the an-swer to how to get people to use safety belts."

MADSEN'S ANNUAL report said

· Evaluating the sheriff's depart-Evaluating the sherit's department's secondary road patrols. Madsen said Sheriff Johannes Spreen has "done an excellent job in deploying personnel to accident areas. Oakland has the only sheriff's department in the state with a true selective enforcement program."

• Working with the road commission on highway risk management, an area the road commission has given number one priority. These include removing hazards; improving intersections for turning movements and installing better motorist information systems.

Identifying problem areas in 28 political subdivisions which have no trained traffic engineers. This is being done with a grant from the state Office of Highway Safety Planning.

· Catching the drinking drivers, who are involved in 95 percent of fatal acciare involved in 95 percent of fatal accidents. Sheriff's deputies will be patrolling specific corridors at pinpointed times and days. Local police are being trained in identifying drinking drivers before they are involved in accidents.

The four-year program is being funded by a \$1.2 million state grant.
