The success of the poetry series at Birmingham Unitarian Church surprised its founder, Margo LaGat-tuta, as much as anyone — maybe

The whole idea for the series, organized for once a month at the Unitarian Church through June, sprang from a workshop Mrs. LaGattuta took at Oakland University.

Mother of three school age children, she returned to the university to complete her degree in English. She developed a consuming interest in writing after she took a course in creative writing from Faye Kichnosway who led off the poerty series last October. The workshop atmosphere, reading works to each other, was so pleasant, Mrs. LaGattuta decided to expand upon it for the general public. There is a dollar charge for the programs which covers the basics like rent and coffee, but doesn't allow for paying the featured poets.
