

## Looking at black holes

Black holes, perhaps the most bizarre celestial phenomena in the known universe, will be featured in January planetarium demonstrations entitled "Whirlpools of Darkness" at Cranbrook Institute of Science.

The show, created by the Gates Planetarium in Denver, is narrated by Leonard Nimoy and includes a fast-paced series of slides and special effects that explain the strange objects.

A black hole is believed to be the corpse of a massive star. All that remains is an intense gravitational field from which nothing — not even light —

can escape. The black hole theory was derived from applying Einstein's equations to objects and events known to exist in the universe.

Planetarium demonstrations — free with museum admission of \$2.50 for adults and \$1.50 for students and senior citizens — begin at 4 p.m. Wednesdays, 2, 3, 4 and 7:30 p.m. Saturdays, and 2, 3 and 4 p.m. Sundays.

Also free with museum admission are observatory demonstrations from 8:30 to 10 p.m. Saturdays.

## Forest students collect presents for Cambodians

When the Scouts ran out of boxes for their school's gifts Girl Scout Troop 127 and the Farmington Hills Women's Club donated enough money to wrap the gifts in tube socks.

Tuesday afternoon the Southern Oakland Girl Scout Council prepared to take the box to its office in Lathrup Village where the Red Cross will pick up the gifts and ship them abroad.

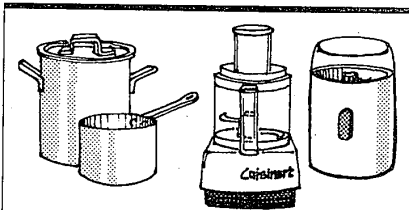
