## 'Great Performances' premieres opera 'Faust'

"Faust," performed by the Lyric Opera of Chicago, includes the internationally famous cast of Mirella Freni as Marguerite, Alfred Krass as Faust and Nicolai Ghiaurov as Mephistopheles. Georges Petre conducts.

This production, taped in September 1979, opened the company's new season and marked its 25th anniversary.

## Five theaters open at Movies in mall

The Movies at Oakland Mall in Troy will open with five new theaters Dec. 21. Film showings will start at 10 a.m. daily and at noon Sunday.

The theaters are a joint enterprise of Taubman Theaters and United Artists Theaters. An early bird admission rate of \$1.50 is offered for all seats from 10 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. daily.

The Movies also has special rates available for senior citizens and students, plus additional bargain prices for afternoon matinees.

Starting times for films in each of the theaters is staggered to avoid

long line-ups at the single box office, lobby and refreshment center serving each complex.

It is a policy of The Movies to endeavor to have at least one "G" or general-audience-rated film, showing in each of its locations every week.

Opening productions include the first-run "The Jerk," starring Steve Martin; "The Rose," starring Bette Midler and Alan Bates; "Apocalypse Now," starring Marlon Brando and Robert Duvall; and "Cuba," starring Sean Connery.

## Masai culture on film

The National Geographic Society film "Man of the Serengeti" will be shown at Cranbrook Institute of Science auditorium Saturday, Dec. 22, in Bloomfield Hills.

The 52-minute film skillfully documents the Masai culture on the Serengeti Plain of northern Tanzania. It compares a Masai boy's outer world experiences with tribal traditions and suggests a harmonious co-existence between the two.

Exceptional photography with par-

ticular emphasis on roving zebras, rhinoceroses and jackals will highlight the film, shown at 2:45 and 3:45 p.m.

The film is free with museum admission of \$2.50 for adults, \$1.50 for student and senior citizens.

Also free with museum admission are planetarium demonstrations at 2, 3, 4 and 7:30 p.m. and observatory demonstrations from 8:30-10 p.m. Saturday museum hours are 1-10 p.m. For more information call 645-3210.
