Scholarship Grants Announced By 4-H

When the 48th National 4-H Congress meets in Chicago, Nov. 30 through Dec. 4, scholarship winners for a number of different grants will be announced.

Information on all the scholarship grants are available from the county extension agents for the state 4-H office.

The grants are: ● Two \$800 scholarships to college freshmen given by Successful Farming through the Edwin T. Meredith Foundation. The grants will be made to present or former 4-H members now enrolled in their first year of college. Applicants will be judged on the basis of interest and desire to enroll in college, financial need and school scholastic record and overall 4-H record.

● Two \$400 college scholarships will be presented by the Milwaukee Road to present or former 4-H members. Candidates for this scholarship must have completed at least one year of 4-H and may be junior or seniors in high school, high school graduates planning to attend college or now enrolled in college. Applicants must indicate an interest and desire to learn about the marketing and transportation of grain.

● The Chicago & North Western Railway Company is offering 11 scholarships of \$500 each to current or former 4-H members who are in their junior or senior year of college or in graduate school.

Eight of the scholarships are offered to students majoring or minor in agricultural economics and three for those in agricultural business or forestry.
