Meals Will Be 'Peachy' In Farmington Schools

OAKLAND COUNTY Meals in the school lunch rooms of Oakland County are going to be peachy for the next three months.

ORDERS FOR 2,124 cases of sliced and halved peaches are now being delivered to the school kitchens of the 16 districts that order their canned foods in a joint purchasing plan sponsored by Oakland Schools.

The quality and quantity of canned peaches was excellent this year, said Miss Vera Jensen, director of School Food Services for Oakland Schools, and the price compared to other fruits, was low. Well serving peach cobbler, peach Betty, upside down cake, peaches in salad and just plain peaches.

There will also be cherries, 655 cases of No. 10 cans (12 cups), were ordered, and pears, 968 cases, and pineapple, 1,380 cases.

The vegetable order reflected the tastes of children: 1,310 cases of green beans and 1,306 cases of corn were ordered in comparison to 462 cases of beets and only 147 cases of asparagus.

THE FALL ORDER totaled 19,489 cases of food at \$115,497. The food will be shipped by suppliers directly to the kitchens of 115 school buildings during the next three months, eliminating warehousing problem for the school districts.

Three times a year representatives of districts in the joint purchasing plan measure

the drained weight of foods from different producers, check the eye and taste appeal and the cost of competing products and vote on the best buy. Their purchase list is then submitted to vendors for competitive bidding.

Districts participating in the food purchase plan this year are Avondale, Berkeley, Birmingham, Bloomfield Hills, Clareville, Clarkston, Farmington, Ferndale, Holly, Lake Orion, Lamphere, Novi, Oxford, Pontiac, Rochester and Southfield.

Food orders from one non-public school, St. John Lutheran of Rochester, are also included in the total purchase order.

Students at Oakland Community College's Orchard Ridge Campus have initiated programs to assist the indigent, and to assist educational opportunities for inmates of the Detroit House of Correction--Plymouth installation.

The Orchard Ridge student government has slated a contest and food drive to assist Mother Watties' Perpetual Help Mission in Detroit, according to Henry Stallings, student government president.

THE CONTEST has been scheduled for Nov. 25, the proceeds of which will go to Mother Watties for use at the mission and Mother Watties herself will visit Orchard Ridge from 12 noon - 3 p.m. on Nov. 25 to speak to the students in Building J-308.

Along with the contest, a food drive for canned and non-perishable food products will be conducted by student government for donation to the mission.

The food will be collected outside the campus bookstore in the sub-plaza level of J Building, Stallings said, in addition to OCC students and staff, the public is encouraged to contribute food to the drive.

The assistance to the Detroit House of Correction -- Ply-

mouth inmates is being planned by Orchard Ridge students who are in the process of preparing the first issue of a self-supporting, weekly 16-page newspaper.

Proceeds from the publication will be donated to a trust fund set up for the educational advancement of inmates housed at the Detroit House of Correction -- Plymouth, according to

Lee Smith and Jim McDonald, members of the six-member Board of Review which will oversee publication.

To be called the Tongue Press the paper will try to bridge the gap between the establishment press and the underground press. The commercial newspapers are too conservative and the underground press is too radical.

Postal Annex Brings Relief

Postmaster General Winton M. Blount announced today a contract has been awarded to provide a carrier annex to better serve the Farmington Area.

The new quarters for the carrier annex, 4275 local Postmaster Henry L. Trombley, will be located at 25575 Grand River.

ALL OF Farmington's driving routes will be handled at the annex, explained Trombley, which amounts to 36 routes. There will be no public service available at the annex.

The annex is being made available through the Post Office Department's lease construction program. The post office will sign a two-year lease with renewal options running through three years.

Mr. and Mrs. Robert J. Amis of 31737 Bella Vista Dr., Farmington, will improve the building to be used as an annex according to postal specifications.

The annex will have 3,665 square feet of interior space plus 7,500 square feet for parking.

BLOUNT EXPLAINS that capital investment will be limited to postal equipment and that the building will remain under private ownership and on local real estate tax rolls.

"This contract is one step closer to improving postal operations for the area," said Blount.

Trombley told The Enterprise & Observer the annex will provide much needed relief for the now over-crowded Farmington Post Office.

The Farmington Post Office, which started out with 39 employees in 1958, now employs 123 persons.
