## Treasures from Chatsworth shown in Toledo

From Jan. 27 through March 2, the Toledo Museum of Art will be the sin-gle Midwest museum to display "Trea-sures from Chatsworth: The Devon-

sures from Chatsworth: The Devon-shire Inheritance. Palatial, 400-room residence of the Duke and Duchess of Devonshire, houses one of the most spectacular private collections in this world. Included in this exhibition to be old master paintings, priss and drawings by Rembrandi, priss and vinci, Rapharand, Gainsborough,

Velasquez, Holbein, Poussin, Durer and Reynolds: lavish gold and silver by Storr and Faberge; contemporary British painting and sculpture; autograph letters from Dickens and Thackeray; grand furniture; stage and costume designs by Inigo Jones, ceramics from Meissen, Deitl and Derby; rare books; brilliantly illuminated medieval mancripts; and remarkable family jewels and jewel-encrusted sculpture. Located in the rolling hills of Derbyshire in the English Midlands, Chats-

worth, with its gardens and collections, has been home to the Cavendish family since the 16th century.
Chatsworth is a home, not a museum, although it welcomes hundreds of thousands of visitors each year. The more than 250 works of art to be seen in Tolledo are nith, however, those generally seen by the public. The majority of

these treasures are those gracing the private apartments of the present residents. Special day and evening group visits to the exhibition can be arranged by calling the museum's appointment secretary at 1-419-255-8000, ext. 65. In addition, guided tours will be available for individuals at 2 p.m. on Sunday,

Feb. 24, and Sunday, March 2.
A program of free, illustrated lectures, films and music has been planned in conjunction with the show. Made possible by a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities, "Art and Life in 18th Century England" will explore such subjects as the English country house, the furniture of

Thomas Chippendale, 18th century dining and drinking, and great English gardens.

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
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
