At Kennedy headquarters

They're beating bushes for Teddy

Kathy Brown took a leave of absence from her
job as a headhunter for the Bendix Corp, to seek
supporters for Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, who'll be
in town Wednesday.

Ms. Brown, 26, is Michigan campaign director
for the Kennedy camp. She shares an office in suite
315 at 17000 Eight Mile, Southfield, with Ken Kruly, 31, imported from Buffalo to be Michigan coordinator. Two full-time paid field workers
are working in Michigan, Ms. Browns said, and two
part-time campaign workers are assigned to recruit Upper Perinsula Dems.

The Michigan headquarters, in Southfield, opened
the first week of January. Ms. Frown and Kruly say
they're confident their candidate will be in the race
through November despite a 21 loss to President
Jimmy Carter in the Iowa caucus.

A good indication that Kennedy is in the race to

stay, said Ms. Brown, is that calls from volunteers and donations picked up after news of the Iowa turnout.

"Obviously Iowa was not terribly helpful," said Ms. Brown, a Troy resident. "However, since Iowa we haven't seen a slackening in the number of people contributing or volunteering. In fact, there was no everwhelming response. We were swamped with volunteers. I can't process them fast enough. I can't get back to them fast enough.

"It's amazing to me the enthusiasm, the amount of time, energy and commitment people are giving to this campaign," said Ms. Brown. "People are giving up the Ms. Stardays, even giving up watching the Super Bowl. Now that's commitment."

TO DRUM UP campaign funds, Kennedy is scheduled to visit Southfield and Birmingham Wednesday evening. A \$100-a-plate reception is scheduled 6-8 p.m. at the Southfield-Sheraton, fol-

lowed by a \$1,000-per-plate dinner at the private home of Birmingham developer Ivan Bloch.

The Michigan Democratic caucus is April 26. Congressional districts throughout the state will hold caucuses to select national convention delayers. Feb. 26 is the deadline for becoming a member of the Democratic Party, and membership is mandatory to participate in the caucus process.

Two volunteers were working at a feverish pact six week trying to contact contributors to William Fitzgerald's and William Ralls's unsuccessful gubernatorial campaigns by phone. Their message was two-fold. Join the party and stump for Kennedy, there's how you go about it," explains Ms. Brown.

Ms. Brown was Oakland County coordinator for Carter in 1976. She said she switched to the Kennedy camp because "this country needs to be united."


