Puccini one-act opera is staged by Oakway

Oakway Symphony and the Birmingham Musicales are co-sponsors and efforts for the concert at 4 p.m. Sunday, March 4, at Seaholm High School.

In addition to an unusual instrumental program, the concert will include Puccini's one-act opera, "Sister Angelica," complete with sets and costumes.

The opera will be performed in English by the Musicales' opera ensemble under the direction of Alice Engram. Marjorie Hedquist of Troy is in the title role and Ariane Koenig of Southfield stars as the Princess.

Others in the cast are: Carol Davis, Clawson; Maureen Kennedy, Royal Oak; Allen Erdmann, Birmingham; Amanda Hinesbaugh, Birmingham; Joyce Koltys, Birmingham; Patricia Mills, Rochester; Charlotte Rappel, Bloomfield Hills; Jeanne Zanislak, Warren; Delores Richards, Birmingham; and Julie Richards, Rochester.

Ms. Hedquist graduated from Oakland University in 1970. She is a student of Alice Engram and Avery Crew. She taught vocal music in Southfield and is currently associated with the Whorf of WJR in the presentation of live Kaleidoscope productions throughout the state.

Ms. Koenig, mezzo soprano, is a voice instructor at Oakland University. She has toured with Michigan Opera Theater in Menotti's "Medium" and has done television and radio work.

In the first half of the program a chamber group from the symphony will play Bach's Concerto in E Minor for Harpsichord. Martha Welton of Birmingham will be the harpsichordist. She will play on an instrument which Roger Welton built to his wife's specifications. Welton, a new member of Oakway Symphony will be playing the flute in the Bach work.

Other musicians who will be playing solo parts in the concerto are Peruz Zerounian, violin; Ara Zerounian, viola; and Paul DiBlasi, cello.

The harpsichord which Mrs. Welton will be playing is a six-foot Zuckerman concert instrument with three choirs — two eight feet and one four feet. The wood is walnut veneer. Mrs. Welton did the decoupage figures on the inner panels. The keys are covered in cherry and the ebony blacks are topped with ivory.
