Destructive Child Needs Expert Help

Parents should seek professional help for the child who destroys for the sake of destroying or enjoys disrupting the play of other children, says Mrs. Kathleen Bifton, extension home economist for Wayne and Oakland Counties.

"Something has gone wrong in this child's growing-up," she says, "and unless handled with skill and deep understanding his attitude can settle into persistent defiance and destructiveness."

"In the case of gang misdeeds commonly committed by 10-15-year-olds, the reasons for this behavior are not hard to find. The child doesn't want to be considered a sissy. He wants to be accepted by the others so he joins them in activities he would never dream of doing on his own."

Mrs. Bifton suggests that lessons in property value, the rights of other people, and sharing the cost of damages (out of his allowance) will help cut down on this kind of destructiveness.

"When there is an undue amount of trouble in a neighborhood, parents would do well to examine the situation
