Men don't have to be helpless

Many men have been programmed by society to be dependent on women as far as household tasks are concerned. These individuals may be competent and reliable at work, said Farmington therapist Lew Zaleski, but at home they can't make coffee or start the washing machine. "It's folly the way we have been trained to be dependent," said Zaleski, 50 per cent of whose practice is made up of males. "It will be the aim of the therapist to inspire men to want to change this situation in a workshop scheduled from 9 a.m. until noon Saturday, March 17, at Schoolcraft College."

Sponsored by the Women's Resource Center, the event will take place in Newman House on Haggerty north of Six Mile. It is titled "A Single Man Can More Than Just Survive: The Fee is \$10. Men's dependence surfaces when he is left alone through divorce, death or separation, said Zaleski. "People tell him he ought to find a wife," he continued. "Males get married quickly after a divorce because of loneliness and because they can't take care of themselves. This is a generalization, of course, and it doesn't apply to all men. "But many of them can be heads of corporations and not be able to cook. "This kind of dependence is a heck of a way to thing on which to base a marriage. It is a sad reason for marriage."

The therapist, who Men come to see him because of two main crisis situations. Either his job or his marriage is going down the tube. Some say that things have gone bad and they want to turn their life around. "Once they make a commitment to becoming more of a total human being, they usually start growing and grow tremendously," said Zaleski.

"There are two elements that increase their chances of success. These are a woman who will be supportive in their effort of their spouse to grow, and male role models who are not totally macho."
