Bowlers throughout the western suburbs have produced many unusual happenings and several of them were written into the records during the past week.

Can you imagine a husband and wife bowling in a mixed league and coming up with the same totals. It happened in the Las Vegas league at Super Bowl.

Hall of Fame adds 3 greats

Three great athletes have been voted into the National Polish-American Sports Hall of Fame, located in Orchard Lake St. Mary High School's Dombrowski Fieldhouse.

They are golfer Al Watrous, former National League second baseman Bill Mazeroski, and U.S. Olympic weightlifting champion Norbert Schemansky.

Watrous led the selections with 103 votes of the 132 ballots submitted by the Hall of Fame Sports Panel, comprised of sports writers, sportscasters, sportsmen and Hall of Famers.

Runerup Mazeroski had 102 votes, while Schemansky received 100 to qualify for the Hall of Fame membership.

Under the Hall of Fame selection rules, a candidate must receive 75 percent of the total votes cast.

Watrous won the Canadian Open golf tournament in 1922, was runnerup to Bobby Jones in the 1926 British Open, a

member of the Ryder Cup Team in 1927 and the U.S. Senior Pro Golf Champ in the 1950s.

Mazeroski, the Pittsburgh Pirates' second baseman for 17 years, posted a .262 batting mark in 1,092 games. He was also a defensive star, winning eight Golden Glove awards, while establishing many major league fielding marks.

Schemansky won gold medals in the 1968 and 1972 Olympic games as a member of the U.S. weightlifting teams.

The election of the trio boosts the National Polish-American Sports Hall of Fame membership to 18 since the inaugural voting in 1973.

The newly-elected Hall of Famers will be honored at a banquet June 14 at the Polish Century Club in Detroit. They will be inducted officially June 15 at the Hall of Fame site.

Bowling with her husband, Jim, Sandy Wolter posted a 532 to match him. The lone difference in their score came in the fact that Jim had a 204 for high game, two pins better than his wife.

The other unusual happening occurred at Wonderland Lanes where it has become a tradition to have at least one 700 series each week in the classic.

This week, the classic scores took a big dip, but the house tradition held when Jim Custer, bowling in the Burroughs loop, came through with a 712 on games of 253, 227 and 232.

While he was doing this, 'Willie'

Keck paced the ladies classic with a 631 that came with games of 200, 203 and 228.

GEORGIE BICKSHOTT won a place on the honor roll at Westland Bowl when she not only showed the way in the ladies classic, but set a new high league mark for the season. She opened with a 248, came back with 255 and closed with 176 for 679.

Nancy Hect was right behind with a high game of 256 in 631. As the season closed, the Livonia Sales team, captained by Hect, won the title and the 288 rolled by Carol

Post some time ago stood up as high game of the year.

ANSWERING THE MAIL. Only two of the all-star bowlers of the past two decades still use the two finger ball. They are Ed Lubanski, who bowls at the Bluejackets and manages Mound Lanes, and Connie Powers, who once was the top average bowler on the old Colonial Branch team.

The two most famous of the three step bowlers who once helped dominate the Detroit scene were Joe Scribner, one time holder of the national match game title, and the late Lee Jougard, who held the high se-

ries record of 775 in the ABC tournament for more than 20 years.

BRAD LACKEY didn't have to hit 600 to lead the St. John Bosco league at Garden Lanes. He set the pace with a 597.

In the other circuits, Dean Tremonti showed the way in the junior house league with a 652. This gave him a big edge on his closest rivals, Bob Sielski, who registered a 623 and Doug Zybrands who had a 617.

BOB SIMON moved into the winner's circle at Merri-Bowl when he put together games of 255, 223 and 267 for 685.

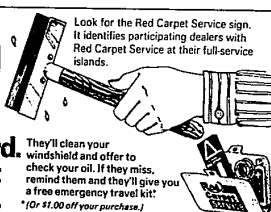
