

OLSM's Evaristo Perez picks Michigan State

Evaristo Perez, Orchard Lake St. Mary's 6-foot, 8-inch center who helped the Eagles capture a Class D basketball crown in his junior year, has signed a national letter of intent to attend Michigan State University in the fall.

Perez, a member of this year's Observer and Eccentric All-Area first team, averaged 21 points and 15 rebounds a game during his senior season. During his junior year he scored 14 points a game while collecting an average of nine rebounds per contest on a

team that posted a 27-0 record.

He is expected to be used as either a power forward or a center for the NCAA champion Spartans.

"Talking in terms of a power forward, he's going to have to improve on foot quickness and jumping ability," St. Mary's basketball coach Bob Shoemaker said.

"He's a good perimeter shooter, but every part of his game can improve. He's going to work, that's for sure."

Perez has been playing basketball for only four years. A native of the Dominican Republic, he came to the states as part of a transfer of cultures between the U.S. and Latin American countries, under the John Kennedy Alliance for Progress.

His foster parents are Dr. and Mrs. Hector Inchaestegui of Beverly Hills.

"When he arrived, they felt a boarding school would be the best situation," Shoemaker said, adding, "So they sent

him here."

Lack of experience and time to improve his ability are what Shoemaker feels Perez needs most.

"Here at St. Mary's everything is so structured that he just didn't have time to really concentrate on his basketball," Shoemaker reflected. "At MSU he'll have the time to really concentrate on it. He has the potential, but he needs a lot of improvement."

Perez is the fourth big man from the state signed by MSU coach Judd Heathcote this year. He joins 6-6 Derek Perry of River Rouge, 6-5 Herb Bostic of Royal Oak Shrine and 6-7 Kurt James, a junior college transfer from Oakland Community College.

Perez had narrowed his choices down to Washington, University of Massachusetts, University of Detroit and Michigan, as well as MSU.

West Bloomfield outruns Clarkston

So far, the dual meet portion of the season has been pretty easy for both the boys and girls track teams at West Bloomfield.

They each chalked up their second and third straight dual meet wins last week, the males beating Clarkston, 87-45, and Milford, 94-38, while the had similar success against the same two schools, beating Clarkston, 87-36, and Milford, 64%-58%.

In the Lakers' win over Clarkston, the boys' team depth proved to be the deciding factor. Clarkston won six of the 13 individual events, but West Bloomfield swept all three relays.

Left Cox, Bob Long, and Jim Bitner each won one individual event and took part on two of the winning relays. Cox won the 100-yard dash (10.2) while Long captured the 330-yard low hurdles (41.3) and Bitner took the 220-yard dash (23.9).

All three teamed with Gary Schroeder on the victorious 880-yard relay team (1:34.9). Schroeder, Bitner and Cox, along with Kevin Chudler, won the 440-yard relay (45.7), while Schroeder and Long combined with Greg Schroeder and Rick Mickley to take the mile relay (3:37.3).

Other winners for the Lakers were Rick Wilson in the shotput (49 feet, 2 inches); Mickley in the 440-yard (10.3); Greg Schroeder in the 880-yard run (2:04.0); and Mark Sinechomb and Darryl Arnett, who tied for first in the pole

vault (11 feet, six inches).

Monique Ozimkowski and Vivian McKenzie once again led the way for West Bloomfield's girls team, each winning three events. In all, the Lakers placed first in 13 of the 15 categories.

OZIMKOWSKI WON THE 110-YARD low hurdles (51.1), the 220-yard low hurdles (30.5) and the 220-dash (26.7). McKenzie took the 100-yard dash (11.8), the 440-yard run (1:03.9) and, together with Barb Allen, Lisa Fitzekam and Elaine Brenner, won the mile relay (4:30.6).

Cindy Poly contributed a pair of first place finishes to the Laker cause, winning the 800-yard run (2:40.7) and the two mile run (12:43.7).

Other winners were: Allen, in the mile run (5:56.3); Kathy Berghoff in the shotput (28 feet, 6 1/2 inches); Jane Perry in the high jump (4 feet, 6 inches); Jeanine Mayone in the discus (78 feet, 3 inches); and the 880-yard relay team of Mayone, Sarah Perry, Maria Rozelle and Donna Hamilton (2:04.6).

Earlier last week, against Milford, the West Bloomfield boys were just as devastating as they extracted a 94-38 victory. But the girls had their problems, as they squeaked by their Milford counterparts posting a 64%-58% win.

Cox once again led the way for the Lakers boys in the 100-yard dash (10.3) and the 220-yard dash (23.4), and running a leg

of two winning relay teams.

Cox combined with Gary Schroeder, Bitner and Long to capture the 880-yard relay (1:34.1) and then teamed with Gary Schroeder, Bitner and Chudler to take the 440-yard relay (45.4).

CHRIS MAYONE CONTRIBUTED two individual first place finishes, winning the 120-yard high hurdles (15.7) and the high jump (6 feet, 2 inches). Long won the 330-low hurdles (40.8) as well as running on the two winning relay teams.

Other winners were Sinechomb in the pole vault (11 feet, 6 inches); Pete Schroeder in the mile run (4:34.5); Greg Schroeder in the 880-yard run (2:01.0); and Rex Fitzekam in the two mile run (9:52.8). Bitner, Mickley, Greg Schroeder and Long combined for a first in the mile relay (3:34.7).

The girls squad won 10 of the 15 events, including all three relays, but still had to hold on to win over Milford.

McKenzie led the way with two individual firsts, in the 100-yard dash (11.2) and the 220-yard dash (26.2), and a pair of wins in the relays.

McKenzie, along with Berghoff, Lisa Gagnon and Lisa Fitzekam won the 880-yard relay (1:49.5), and then she teamed with Jane Perry, Berghoff and Allen to take the mile relay (4:15.5).

Ozimkowski clipped in two individual first place finishes and another in the 440-yard relay. She won the 110-yard high hurdles (15.2) and the 220-yard low hurdles (29.7), and combined with Gagnon, Fitzekam and Mayone to capture the relay (5:2.2).

West Bloomfield's girls' softball team continued to hit hard, this time forcing Greater Oakland Athletic League opponent Rochester to yield to the mercy rule, as the Lakers pounded out a 26-7 win Wednesday.

Barb Arnold was the hitting hero with three hits in five trips to the plate and four runs batted in. Sandy DeCivito went two-for-four and knocked in three markers, while Teri Dixon had two hits and an RBI.
