## San Antonio a sensual delight 😴 dancing to strummed guitars



The four-night, Night in Old San Antonio festivity combines tradi-on, which dates back to the 1850s, with bowls of hot chile con carne and tortillas. Volunteer chile queens, members of the Conservation Society, serve up the spicy specialities.

The most famous as a present-day

They disappear to the sound of Mexican music around the natural bend of the river and the man-made canal that leads to HemisFair Plaza.

Have you ever wondered what it's like to be a travel filmmaker, one who shows films to audiences nationwide? Ken Lawrence of Pontiac will tell you that it's great fun, as long as you don't have to eat too much.

Like most romantic-sounding jobs, it has a price.

Ken got into broadcasting during his Air Force years in Savannah,
Ga., and has been a broadcaster for stations all over the country.

He spent 10 years as a television anchorman, and his voice was previously heard over the television airwaves in Lansing and Bay City.

"In Bay City, I invented a half-hour, two-man news program long before Huntley and Brinkley came along." he says. "The station manager took it off because he said nobody would watch a program like that."

It was during his first trip to Europe that Ken began to long for a traveling life. He was shooting pictures with an Instamatic at the time, but he decided to do better.

With a lot of self-tutoring and a little help from his technically proficient friends, he bought a 16mm Canon Scoopic movie camera and went to work.

He now has three full-length travel films that he shows to civic and social groups throughout the country. The films are about Michigan, Austria and Britain. "My first booking was in La Fox, Illinois," Ken says. "I was hired by the Friends Bible College, which operates out of a cornfield there.

"I was very nervous and I got more nervous when I faced an audience of 300 high school students and realized that they were adherents of a fundamentalist religion and I would probably have to be careful about what I said."

"There is no way I can make a living from this, much as I'd love to," he says. "I get 10 bookings a year, and I would need 30 to survive at a basic level.

"It's a very difficult business to break into at the ground level."



#### Master of the draw
