Horse show prepares steeds for 2nd week of activities

The \$5,000 Motor City Jumper Classic will be the highlight of this week's equestrian competition at the Bloomfield Open Hunt Club (BOH) during the second week of the three-week horse show.

Over the past weekend the dressage horses had the spotlight at BOH. Now the hunters and jumpers take the reins.

Competition, beginning June 13-17, will include four \$1,000 events: the amateur classic, the junior hunter classic, and two open jumper classes.

The extras scheduled for the current week is the Wayne State University Challenge Cup, and the BOH's long list of trophies. The Challenge Cup will be presented Friday night to that evening's

open jumping winner by Dr. Thomas Bonner, WSU president. Bonner and his party will be BOH dinner guests preceding the competition.

The Motor City schedule lists 112 separate award classes, and more than 400 horses from all corners of the nation will be shown. Monetary awards for the entire 17 days of the three shows

exceed \$58,000. Competition starts at 9 a.m. daily at BOH.
