

# Surplus given the once-over by city hall watcher Vagnozzi

A \$1 million surplus in the city coffers is too high and expenditures are escalating too fast, said Farmington Hills city hall-watcher Aldo Vagnozzi this week.

Vagnozzi, a member of the Commis-sion on Aging, and a Farmington Hills

resident, attended recent budget hearings and the 1979-1880 budget approval meeting in city council chambers last Monday.

"The surplus represents 2½ mills. That equals 25 percent of locally generated properly tarse," Vagnozzi said.

City council will decide how the \$1

million will be spent.

Vagnozzi proposed that a '\$100,000 fund be set aside for emergencies, like the tee storm which zapped Oakland Control of the set o

ozzi offered other suggestions -efficiency within the \$12 milfor cost-effi lion budget.

"I think the city should scrutinize boards and commissions. There has been a 50 percent increase for planning consultants (\$45,400)," he said.

"The library and district court, be-suse of a \$600,000 renovation, are

The Zoning Board of Appeals and the Planning Commission are the only two from a field of more than a dozen boards and commissions in which members are paid. Vagnozzi says all board and commission members should serve voluntarily.

THE COST OF corporation counsel, the city's legal department, has risen 57 percent in two years, Vagnozzi said.
