All-area baseball team one of O&E's best ever

Hitting and pitching. That ideal blend is what makes the 1979 Observer & Eccentric All-Area Baseball Team perhaps one of the best we've ever presented.

Picked recently by a vote of area coaches, the team has a lofty combined batting average of .385. The staff of three pitchers has only five losses between them in some 20 decisions.

The 1979 team consists of 12 players. There were three pitchers, four infielders, three outfielders, and, because of a tie in voting, two catchers selected.

The four-man infield consists of Rochester's Tom Dieters, West Bloom-field's John Alexander, North Farming-ton's Mike Thompson and Rochester Admiss Scott Harris.

went undeficated (10-9). The all-league fielder scored the winning run in a 5-4 victory over Andover which clinched the league title.

The O&E's all-star outfield is North Farmington's Tom Godwin, Rice's Dennis Ray and Lahser's Dave Mitch-

Ray was one of Rice's most consistent offensive threats. He led the team runs scored (19), was tied in leadership for most hits (25), was second in total RBI's (16), and had an average of 229.

total trus (1b), and nad an average of 229, seedy senior outfielder, Ray had a 309 fielding percentage.
Mitchell, a junior, is the only under-classman on the veteran O&E team. The hard-hitting right hander averaged a sparkling 435, with five home runs, one triple and three doubles which was sood for 21 RB1's.

He was selected a first-team Metro-Suburban Activities Association (MSAA) and first-team all-region player. Lahser and Troy Athens tied for third place in the MSAA.

PITCHING

The talented mound corps consists of Rice's Ed Lynch, North Farmington's Ron Fredericks and West Bloomfield's Steve Sudbay.

Lynch had an overall 7-2 mark, with 1.18 earned run average. He faced 21 batters, striking out 62 and walking 6

Headed for a Florida junior college, Lynch had a .313 batting average. Lynch beat Catholic Central — which won the state class A baseball title last weekend — twice this season.

Fredericks is a senior righthander who had a 5-2 record, and a superb 1.25 ERA. Named North Farmington's most valuable player, Fredericks hurled two shutouts, struck out 39 and walked 16.

Fredericks, who doubled for coach Jerry Maxwell as an infielder, batted 345. Sudbay was one of GOAL'S premier

pitchers.

Part of a staff which averaged only two walks per game, Sudbay saved his best performance this season in a doubleheader, against Clarkston. The senior righthander registered the win and provided all the run production in a 4-2 opening-game victory. He finished the afternoon with six RBI's and three doubles.

A three-point academic student, Cur-cio broke five single-season school re-cords this spring. They include most times at bat (68), most hits (34), most home runs (eight), most RBI'S (27), and best batting average (-400).

Ratkowiak had 25 hits, and finished with a .368 average. The senior catcher led the team with 11 doubles, and accu-mulated a team-leading 17 RBI's.
