

Upsets abound in Sibley's tennis tournament

Upsets were the name of the game at the seventh annual Sibley's Shoes Tennis Tournament last weekend at the Detroit Squash and Tennis Club in Farmington Hills.

By the time final play began in the four men's and one women's singles divisions, many of the top seeds were

gone. And others didn't make it past that final round.

In the men's open division, top seed Maurice Hunter, a former Detroit now living in Hollywood, Cal., was unable to handle Jerry Karzen of Glenview, Ill. The match took three sets, but Karzen won the top prize of \$750 by

whipping Hunter, 7-6 (5-0 in the tiebreaker), 6-3, 6-3.

In the women's open division, Judi Stiff of Royal Oak defeated Laura Tatt of Oak Park, 6-4, 4-6, 6-3. Stiff was rated 14th in women's singles by the Southeastern Michigan Tennis Association and Tatt was sixth.

In two of the three remaining divisions, the top seeds did manage to capture the first place finish. But several of the other seeded players were long gone by the time the finals got under way.

In the Men's 35 Division, top-seeded Joe Bachmann of Columbus, O., was an easy victor over George Smillie of Ann Arbor, 6-0, 6-2. Bachmann was absent from last year's tourney, but was a winner in the division in the three previous years.

IN THE MEN'S 45 Division, Leonard Brose of Southfield successfully defended his title and his top seeding with a 6-4, 4-6, 6-3 win over Jim Zeron of Windsor.

And in the Men's 55 Division, Jim Tobin downed Bill Maul of Detroit, 6-4, 6-1.

It was a tough tournament for some of the old favorites who had done so well here in the past. Chuck Brainard won the Open Division in 1977 and was a finalist in 1978. But this time out, Bay Valley resident was a first-round loser Brainard fell to Mike Rose of Grosse Ile, 2-6, 7-6 (5-3 in the tiebreaker), 6-4.

Rose, in turn, was a quarterfinal loser to Hunter.

Second-seeded Graham Snook, who won the Men's Open title last year, was dumped in the first round, as Mike Ware topped him by 7-6, 5-7, 6-3 scores.

Two Southfield residents were semifinal losers to Hunter and Karzen in the

Men's Open Division. Mark Pinchoff, a West Bloomfield High School graduate and a candidate for the National Junior Davis Cup team, lost to Karzen, 6-2, 6-1.

Brain Marcus, who heads the Tennis Academy in Oak Park, was beaten by Hunter in the semis, 5-7, 6-4, 6-1.
