Not forgetting municipal government, Mrs. Styre included a depiction of the Farmington Township Hall and

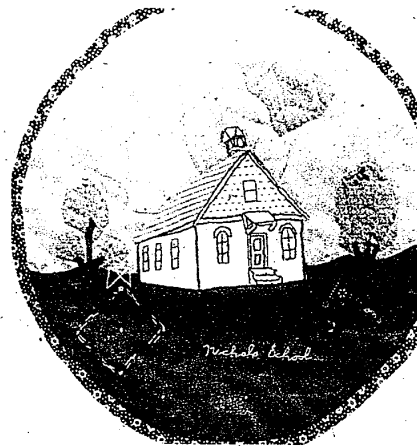
Masonic Temple building on Grand River and Farmington Road.

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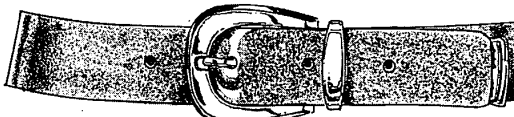

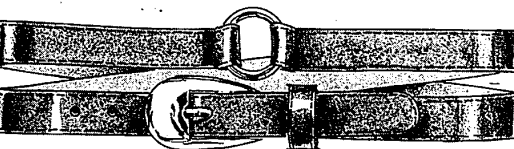
