Tolerance

Singles and couples without children being accepted

Americans are becoming more tolerant toward people who choose not to marry and couples who choose not to have children, a University of Michigan psychologist reports.

In their own lives, however, marriage and family relationships are still the key sources of personal identity and satisfaction.

Elizabeth Douvan draws these observations from the results of two surveys taken in 1957 and 1976 by the U-M Institute for Social Research (ISR). Both years, a national sample of 2,400 adults were questioned about three central life goals: work, marriage and parenthood.

The comparison data are providing some unique insights into ways American attitudes have changed within the last generation, Ms. Douvan said.

THE RESPONDENTS were far more judgmental in 1957 about the character of people who chose not to marry, Douvan reports. "In 1957, four-fifths of the respondents saw such people as immoral, selfish or neurotic. Only one-fifth gave opinions that were relatively neutral. By 1976, these figures had shifted to less than one-quarter negative and two-thirds neutral.

"These findings reflect the normative climate of 1957, when marriage was defined as the only legitimate status for women," Ms. Douvan added.

"Among the 1957 respondents who had never been married, women were considerably more positive about marriage than men. Women who had experienced marriage, however, were always more negative about marriage than were men. One of the most dramatic changes in the 1976 data was the decline in single women's evaluation of marriage."

The 1976 respondents were also essentially neutral toward a young couple who decide never to have children; they were not likely to see childlessness as either neurotic or morally

repensible as those in the earlier survey.

"AS PEOPLE grow more tolerant toward a variety of life styles, one might expect the negative effect of choosing a deviant (that is, non-normative) life style would also diminish," Ms. Douvan observed. "But in both 1957 and 1976, the two groups which showed notable symptoms of stress were single men and divorced women."

"The unmarried male in our culture still has not been specialized with adequate social and interpersonal skills to create and maintain a reasonably satisfying life with people on his own—that is, without a wife to initiate and maintain friendships and kinship ties."

"And the divorced woman—particularly if she is raising children alone—faces realities like poverty and role overload which are so oppressive that they make the social stigma pale by comparison."

ASIDE FROM questions having to do with a generalized view of marriage and its meaning, the ISR researchers found considerable stability in the structure of attitudes and values related to family.

"The relationships among marital happiness and problems, happiness and the sense of adequacy in the spouse or parent roles remain essentially the same over the generation," Ms. Douvan said.

"When the respondents were asked to choose values they thought were most important in their own lives, they all most uniformly rated family roles higher than job roles," she explained.

"The only exceptions were older women who reported that the job allowed them more self-actualization than marriage, and even for them, parenting yielded more self-actualization than the job."

THE DOMINANCE of family roles over work is the same for males and females, the report indicated. Questioned whether they would rather be seen by others as a successful parent, spouse or worker, the respondents chose family roles over work roles by a ratio of over three to one.

Within the family sphere, the spouse role dominated over the parent role by a three to two margin for men and slightly less for women.

"The fact that people value their family attachments does not, of course, mean that marriage and parenthood are without conflict," Douvan said. "The 1976 findings reveal a significant

increase in peoples' awareness of marital stress, and of the fact that family roles involve problems and burdens as well as satisfactions."

In 1976, respondents are more likely to say that they have at some point had problems with their marriages. The increase is larger for men—from 38 percent in 1957 to 49 percent in 1976 than for women—45 percent to 62 percent.

Overall, however, the two surveys reveal "no decrease in peoples' feelings of adequacy in the marital role, and a rather strong trend toward increased happiness in marriage."

Drawings donated to cancer foundation

Two Michigan artists, architect Louis Redstone, and Detroit artist, Janet M. Anderson have donated drawings for the 1979 Michigan Cancer Foundation greeting card collection to be previewed in mid-July.

"The addition of two of our state's well-known artists helps us emphasize the work the foundation does for all Michigan residents," said Mrs. Frank Gormack, Jr., Michigan Cancer Foundation Trustee.

Both artists' selections are suitable for framing and gift-giving as well as mailing. Redstone's work is a box of 14 cards containing an assortment of seven watercolor renderings.

Ms. Anderson's card is a watercolor lithograph of St. Anne Cathedral in Detroit, the first established church in Michigan.

It is the first card in a forthcoming series of church sketches.

Born in Royal Oak, she began her

formal art education early at Cranbrook and Dondro High. Ms. Anderson studied at the University of Michigan, Pratt Institute in New York and the Center for Creative Studies in Detroit.

Her "Picture Detroit" sketches were inspired by photographs taken by her grandfather, a Bob-Lo boat captain. Her pen and ink drawings and watercolors are featured in the Robert Findahl Galleries at the Detroit Renaissance Center and the Odyssey Gallery in Novi.

Redstone was first associated with the foundation in 1974 when he designed the Meyer L. Prentis Cancer Center. His architectural designs include the Michael Berry International Terminal in the Wayne County Airport and the Manufacturer's National Bank Operations Center at Lafayette and Cass.
