CERTAINLY James Taylor is a flature of popular music but his professional pride keeps him from getting stagnat. His live performances add new arrangements to old standards without diluting the original flavor. The new songs fit is comfortably and the spirit was the highest I've ever seen at a Taylor connect.

The performance consisted of more than 92 song, drawing material from usarly all of his nine albums. There wasn't a mediocre song in either set, which is unusual for any performer. J.T. has always had a class sound but his live performances display a broader scope than do his recordings. Several artists have found platitum from recording live albums and certainly the folks from Columbia must have thought about a live James Taylor album. Well, you blew it Sunday's concert would have been one fine performance to have on tape.

ness.

Even Oakway's selections for unin-terrupted performance aren't com-pletely safe from spontaneous disrup-tion and ad libs.

Conductor Francesco DiBlasi will direct compositions by Offenbach, Smetana, Lehar, Liszt, Rachmaninoff and Bernstein.

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
