## Man rescues youngster from burning garage

A Redford Township man recently saved the life of a young boy in a dar-ing rescue the boy's mother calls a mir-acle.

"It not for God and Mike (Michael Adamic,Sr.), Franklin wouldn't be here today," said a grateful Mrs. Peggy Hayler.

She said her 3-year-old was saved by an act of God. And there is some startling evidence which gives her good reason to believe that.

Mrs. Havier said a white Bible was found in the rubble of the charred garage. The Bible, she noted, was discovered on top of the work bench under which Franklin had sought cover from the blaze.

"The Bible is still in perfect condi-tion," Mrs. Havier said. "It was not burned or discolored by the fire. But everything else on the bench, including some other books, were ruined by the fire.

A miracle is the only way to describe it," she added.

Franklin Havier is alive because of the heroics of Adamic, a 16-year Red-ford Township resident who lives with

his family at 20548 Denby.

Ammle said he was helping his two children with a morning paper route on the day the fire broke out in the Havier garage at 20398 Indian, in Redford Township.

"After dropping off a paper at the Havier home, I turned around and saw smoke," Adamic said. "As I reached the burning garage (which adjoins the Havier home), I saw several people standing around, then I saw Mrs. Havier and I heard her say her son was inside. Mrs. Havier, who was in a state of hysteria during the fire, said she can't recall what her thoughts were at that

"I don't ever want to go through that again," she said in an interview at Providence Hospital in Southfield,

Providence Hospital in Southfield, where her son is recovering and is llst-ed in good condition.

Franklin, the youngest of three Havier children, suffered third degree burns on both his legs along with first and second degree burns on this face, ears and hands Adamic escaped injury. The cause of the blaze is undetermined.

The cause of the Diagonal Transition of the Markin, his legs wrapped in gauze, undergoes daily 15-minute whirlpool treatments at Providence Hospital in preparation for future skin grafts, said Mrs. Havier.

"We had been staying with Franklin all-day and night in the hospital because he was having bad dreams on occasion," Mrs. Havier said. "He would

wake up crying in a cold sweat. But he's doing good for all he's been he's doing good for all he's been all night with him," she said.


