# These museums span history with a state-raising tale

Michigan's museums tell a story that spans the state's mining, lumbering and Great Lakes shipping eras and creaches back to the days of the Indians

and the missionary-explorers.

Automobile Club of Michigan reports
these museums house some of the
world's finest artwork, salute internationally famous skiers, pay tribute to the state's auto and furniture industries and explore the world of science.

ALPENA'S Jesse Besser Museum of Art, Science and History boasts one of the Midwest's finest artifact collections on early man in the Great Lakes.

At Harbor Springs, the museum
named for Ottawa Chief Andrew J.
Blackhird is boused in the century-old
dwelling he used while acting as postmaster for the early settlers and traders. On exhibit are birch bark canoes,
quill baseks, wampum, paintings,
maps and household implements.

Indian relics also are displayed at Copper Harbor's Astor House Museum, Copper Harbor's Astor House Museum, named for the man who made millions in fur trading in the 19th Century. Other big attractions include a collection of 300 antique dolls and exhibits devoted to mining, the railroads and the Great Lakes.

Other fine museums in the Upper Peninsula include the one at Lake Lin-den, which is housed in an old Calumet & Hecla mining office building. It fea-tures relies from the days when copper was king.

An average 8.75 percent tuition hike will greet University of Michigan students on the Ann Arbor campus this fall.

The new rates range from 8602 per term for resident freshmen and sophomores to \$2,950 for non-resident medical students. In addition, all students will be charged a \$16 registration fee per term. However, most major 'alboratory fees' are being eliminated.

The new tultion rates all fall within the guidelines tentatively approved by the U-M Regents hast April.

"Our objectives were to build a budg-ct capable of sustaining a quality program as well as to keep tuttion increases as moderate as possible in the circumstances," said Harold T. Shapiro, U-M vice president for academic affairs.

Among the Detroit Institute of Arts' most notable exhibits are collections of African art, 17th Century Dutch and Flemish paintings, and armor.

The Flint Institute of Arts features Renalssance art, tapestries and furni-ture plus antique French paperweights and Oriental art. Grand Rapids' fine art collection is housed in a building erected in 1844.

Grand Rapids also has a Public Mu-seum and Planetarium with displays devoted to Michigan wildlife, plants and archeology plus a special section

on furniture in tribute to the city's fame as Furniture City. Michigan's wildlife is highlighted at the cave-like Call of the Wild Museum Michigan's wildlife is highlighted at the cave-like Call of the Wild Museum at Gaylord. Exhibits on animals, birds, insects and all manner of things of in-terest to youngsters can be found at the Children's Museum in Detroit and at Cranbrook Institute in Bloomfield

Holland, Dutch capital of the United States, is the site of the Netherlands Museum, a collection of memorabilia from both Old and New World Dutch heritage.

The stagecoach days are recalled with a visit to Historic Walker Tavern at Cambridge Junction in the Irish Hills. It was an important stop on the old Petroit-Chicago stagecach line. Huron City was a major logging community in the 1856s but forest fires and heavy logging ended the area's numbering business and it soon became a ghost town. Seven of the ortginal buildings have been restored, and there is a museum open to the public in summer.




