A Pink Tea was served by the Baptist ladies in the church Thursday evening. There was a nice supper and delightful program.

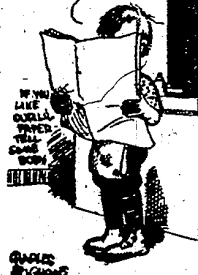
