

Harrison Parents Meet New School's Principal

FARMINGTON Parents of future Harrison High School students met recently with the school's principal, Lewis Schulman, to discuss tentative plans relating to curriculum and scheduling.

The Farmington parents group is an informal advisory committee of about 30 volunteers.

They were invited by Schulman to ask questions and give suggestions.

SCHULMAN fully expects accreditation for college entrance to be granted by North Central Association in time for the first graduating class of June 1972, he told them.

Harrison, on 12 Mile west of Middle Belt, will attempt to avoid study halls. Instead, student days will be composed of eight 45-minute periods. "This permits wider, more varied course selections, and increases room usage," the principal explained. The parent committee unanimously endorsed this concept.

Originally, grades nine through 11 will occupy the structure designed for 1,600. The ninth grade will be phased out after the first year, with a

12th grade added. Social studies will follow a program similar to that at North Farmington, Schulman said. Its senior English studies will be akin to those at Farmington High, and there will be some innovations unique to the new school.

Already, a sports league with other new schools has been set up by Jack Cotton's physical education department.

A STUDENT ADVISORY com-

mittee is working with Schulman to decide on such items as school mascot, colors, and names of teams. They will also consult with him about curriculum, furnishings, and other related matters.

Busy Beautifiers

FARMINGTON The growing ambition of the City of Farmington Beautification Committee has resulted in a full calendar of projects for 1969-70.

A new project will be installation of suggestion boxes in public city buildings so residents can submit ideas on how to improve and keep Farmington beautiful.

The committee is also discussing a possibility of a joint venture with the Farmington Board of Commerce for a flower box program throughout the business district, providing flower boxes to improve the general aesthetics of the downtown area.

For December, the committee will sponsor a Home Christmas Decoration Contest and hold a special committee meeting.

After a break in January, the group will then spend February visiting other beautification committee meetings in neighboring communities to gather fresh ideas and approaches.

Coin collecting is his main hobby but he is also interested in model rocketry and mathematics. He has been delivering newspapers for about three years.


