

Do-It-Yourself Saves Schools Money

In an economy move, the Farmington Board of Education has authorized use of school personnel to install a new boiler at Woodale Elementary School, resulting in a savings to the district of about \$4,000. The boiler at Woodale quit and must be replaced before school weather sets in or the school will have to be closed. Bids were advertised and when opened, ranged from \$14,000-\$26,000, much higher than the \$10,000 cost-estimate originally anticipated. The bids were taken on the basis of the mechanical con-

tractors providing all the labor and materials with the exception of the boiler itself which would be purchased by the district and supplied to the contractors.

TRUSTEE RICHARD PETERS reported to fellow board-members that all bids received were quite a bit in excess of what the administration thought was adequate to do the job. The boiler cost a little less than \$5,000 and, by using school personnel, Peters said the task could be completed for about \$10,000. The bids were rejected and the administration has been authorized to purchase the boiler and proceed with installation prior to the opening of school. Peters explained most of the work can be done by the school's heating specialists but some work, such as welding, will have to be hired out on a time-material basis.

The superintendent and his assistant differed with Clifford stating the work couldn't be financed by the district on bond sale.

The administration was directed to analyze the bids, report on alternative methods to repair the track and courts, and recommend how the work could be financed.

MEANWHILE, the district is anxiously awaiting word from Lansing on approval of its application to sell \$9 million in bonds as approved by local voters. The track is in bad condition due to a large water-hole and grass is growing through both tennis courts. But the board is fully aware that \$40,000 will be hard to find in the budget, especially for non-instructional items. Trustee Leland Clifford stated the track has been in horrible shape for the past five years and the board should do something. He asked if the wording of the last bond issue wouldn't allow for the work to be financed as an improvement and paid under Building and Site funds.
