**Historic Dead Sea.**

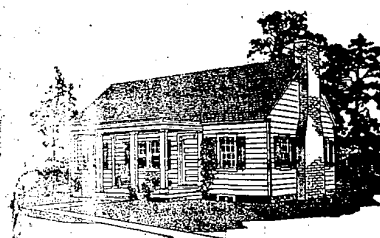
