

# Credit Bill Gets Bipartisan Votes

All four observant area congressmen voted for a bill that stands controls over all forms to credit for possible use by the president, which is considered an unprecedented anti-inflation "big stick."

## Esch Backs Cards For Xuan Thuy

WASHINGTON

Congressman Marvin L. Esch (R-Ann Arbor) has called upon North Vietnam to reveal the names of American prisoners, provide humane treatment for such prisoners and to grant their early release. The House has overwhelmingly adopted a resolution along these lines.

At the same time, the second-term congressman from the 12th District, which includes Plymouth, urged Americans of all political views to seek the same ends.

"One such means," Esch explained, "has been suggested by my Michigan colleague, Sen. Robert Griffin: the sending of Christmas cards to Minister Xuan Thuy, chief of the North Vietnamese delegation to the Paris talks."

"EACH CARD," Esch said, "should urge the Communists at the very least release the names of American prisoners. We also should urge humane treatment in accordance with the Geneva Convention and release prisoners in the near future."

The U.S. Jaycees, a non-partisan organization, has arranged to deliver the cards to the North Vietnamese leaders. They should be sent to: Project Xuan Thuy, Box 2600, Washington, D.C. 20013.

Former Plymouth resident Woodell Smith, now chairman of the board of directors of the national Jaycee organization and formerly U.S. Jaycee president, is an active promoter of the Christmas card campaign.

State Sen. Lorraine Beebe (R-12th District) has introduced a bill making it mandatory for public schools to receive a minimum of \$300 per child.

## Retirement, Nursing Homes To Boom

Retirement communities and nursing homes will be two of the biggest growth areas in real estate in 1970, according to Prof. Karl G. Pearson, director of the University of Michigan program in real estate education.

"The reasons are three for all to see: increased life expectancy and proportionately more people of retirement age; earlier retirements; desire for independence in the later years, and the means now to gratify this desire, and the pleasures that come from consort with one's peers."

Pearson noted that the sun all retirees wish to migrate south: "Many realize that the sun also shines up north, as it does in Michigan. Here they may stay where they have roots, be close to friends and relatives, and have ready access to interstate highways to take them to the cities."

Along with the growth in retirement communities will be a corresponding growth of nursing homes, he added.

"Chains of nursing homes will be put together. In terms of beds available, nursing homes will have more than regular hospitals. Over half of the revenue for their operation will come from Medicare, Medicaid, and other welfare programs."

"The present 20 million people in our country aged 65 or over will grow to 25 million by 1985. This is the group that will have greatest need for nursing home facilities," he concluded.

Pearson, a faculty member of the U-M Graduate School of Business Administration, pointed out that retirees want a comfortable but not demanding home, and like to be near churches, shopping centers, and convenient transportation.

"They like the things they were used to back home—the service clubs, fraternal organizations, hobby societies, and veterans associations," he said. "They want ready access
