The combined events made an evening of unusual pleasure for everybody. The financial results netted about \$500.

New Stores and Offices Plan Openings This Week

Completion of New Building Marks New Business Era
TWO STORES NOW OPENED

Probably the largest improvement in Farmington by any one institution or person, is the new bank building and its new stores.

We cannot possibly realize just how much until they are fully equipped and opened and until they have become dependent upon them.

There are two store now in active operation. These are Farm Fruit and Vegetable Store and Steffens Meat Market. Mr. Farmer is one of our local men, formerly with the A. & P. Store.

Mr. Farmer resigned his position with the A. & P. and started one next to the bank proper, on Grand River avenue. He already has a large and assorted line of choice vegetables and fruits. In conjunction with these Mr. Farmer also has groceries and canned goods.

To Mr. Steffens of Redford, goes the credit for one of the finest markets in Michigan, not excluding Detroit. The market consists of a large ice machine and refrigerators with fine display covers. Everything is new and it is a pleasure to go in and look around.

Two mammoth big boxes of flowers are on the counters, gifts of the different concerns. A tile floor insures cleanliness.

Mr. Steffens has planned to make his home here and next week may see them comfortably settled. They are welcomed most heartily by Farmington.

The Edison Co.'s office was the first to open for the transaction of business. They are planning on carrying a large display of elec-

trical appliances. This office is directly across from the Enterprise building.

Mr. M. B. Pierce will occupy the office next to the bank on Division street with a barber shop.

Call Special Election For Bond Issue For Water Works And Sewer

Water Tank to Eliminate Danger of Fire

LAND FOR SEWER OUTLET URGED

At the regular meeting of the Village council held Monday evening, December 5, a resolution was acted upon calling attention to the necessity of providing a water tank of 250,000 gallons capacity, in order to stabilize and increase the water supply of Farmington Village. Also a resolution was passed in regard to ownership of land at the outlets of the sewers.

A bond issue of \$10,000 and 5,000 for the above-mentioned water and sewer improvement will be voted upon by the people in the latter part of January.

Improvements for water and sewer should receive careful consideration from the people and favorable action should come always when the welfare of the community is at stake, as has been mentioned in these columns before. The water tank will do away with shortage of water supply when pumps or other machinery breaks or when Edison current is cut off, also in case of fire a larger reserve is needed than the tank will provide. The pressure will be more uniform and the expense of electricity for power will be less.

The sewer outlets at the present time are on land owned by private parties which places the village at the mercy of individuals who naturally criticize and find fault with conditions, no matter what

they may be. The time is near when the village will be required to have a sewerage disposal plant, then the land would have to be purchased anyway and the council is of the opinion that before purchase should take place before private interests do so and communicate the titles and raise the price beyond what it may be now, either through natural or artificial causes. The land could have been purchased ten years ago for \$100 an acre—maybe if we wait longer we may pay more.
