TRAINED YOUTH THE WORLD'S GREAT NEED

Dr. James King, president of Olivet College, gave an address before the Rotary Club of Jackson and the boys of the Senior class of the city's school were special guests for the occasion. The speaker declared the need of the world to-day was trained men, who have received a practical education, not a theoretical one, and he drew a vivid word picture of the opportunities confronting the educated youth of to-day.

"Some of the greatest contributions to the progress of civilization have been made by young men," the educator declared. "In the military world," he continued, "we read about Alexander, who conquered Greece at the age of 21, and Persia at 29, and died at 30. We read of Hannibal of Carthage, who at 28 avenged the death of his father and at 29 won the greatest victory of his life. William the Conqueror came to the throne when a boy, subdued the barons and won the battle of Hastings and died at 35. Oliver Cromwell was a member of parliament when the petition of rights was passed and he was only 31 years old at the time. Napoleon conquered Italy when he was 21 and at 35 was the arbiter of Europe. The Duke of Wellington was 33 at the battle of Waterloo. In the late war many of the generals were men with the snow-capped heads. But remem-

ber 28,000 of our finest young men left Old Glory and fled to fight under other flags before we entered the war. The enemy's ranks broke under the high idealism of the young men of America. Out of 3,927 who won the Victory Cross 2,969 were under 26 years old.

World Needs Youth.
The speaker declared that Shakespeare had made his principal contributions to the world at 35 and after 40 did practically nothing. Milton, he said, wrote the "Hymn of Nativity" at 25 and reached the high-water mark at 29.

"It is possible," Dr. King said, in conclusion, "for a boy to be an old man at 18 years of age, if he becomes skeptical and fails to grasp the high ideals of life. It is possible for a high school boy to be a fossil. The youth of this nation have in their hands the moulding of this great democracy. They are face to face with a world on fire. We need trained youth with vision. We need historians, economists and sociologists. We need men who can see the social injustice on the side of capital and on the side of labor. Do not wait for the psychological moment to come, but create it. The opportunity is at hand."

FOCH'S BEST GIFT.

Ferdinand Foch, marshal of France and commander-in-chief of the allied armies in the world war, sailed for home the other day laden with gifts of every kind from the American people during his triumphal tour of the country.

But his most precious gift, and the one that he guarded most carefully, was a little geranium, grown in a cheap earthen pot. It was given him by a mother in Indiana, who asked that it be planted on the grave of her son who fell at Soissons. Marshal Foch assured her that this will be done, after he has taken a branch of it to be planted in the yard of his home.

A simple little thing, but it shows the big heart of a very big man. No wonder the people of the earth unite in honoring Marshal Foch, first soldier of the world.

STATE TAKES ACTION AGAINST DELAYING BIRTH AND DEATH REPORTS.

Preliminary proceedings for prosecution against 25 local registrars of vital statistics in 18 different counties are being instituted by the state department of health following alleged failure of registrars to comply with the law which requires reports of births and deaths to be filed with state authorities before the fifth of each succeeding month.

County prosecuting attorneys have been mailed the names of the offenders and histories of the individual cases which will enable them to take immediate action.

Failure to perform any of the duties imposed upon the local registrars is deemed a misdemeanor and upon conviction is punishable with a fine of from \$10 to \$100, imprisonment of not more than 30 days, or both fine and imprisonment. This penalty is provided in both the birth and death registration laws. Thus a registrar be liable to a \$200 fine and 60 days' imprisonment.

Accurate keeping of birth and death records is considered one of the highest marks of development of intelligence by civilization," says Dr. R. M. Olin, commissioner of health.

Every certificate filed with the department is examined and all information tabulated for legal and public health uses. Whenever reports are delayed from a community there is the possibility that outbreaks of disease may occur there which might have been curbed if the reports of deaths had been received by health authorities on time."

D. U. R. APPEALS FARE, SUIT.

Judge L. W. Carr, in the Ingham circuit court, Tuesday denied the application of the D. U. R. for dismissal of the injunction under which the company is compelled to observe the rates of interurban fare established in the Glaspie act. The company is expected to appeal immediately to the supreme court in an effort to have the Glaspie act declared unconstitutional.

This act provides that interurban roads whose gross passenger earnings in 1920 exceed \$14,000 a mile, may not charge more than one and one-half cents a mile, those earning less than \$14,000 may charge two cents a

mile, those earning less than \$12,000 a mile may charge two and one-half cents, and those earning less than \$10,000 a mile may charge three cents a mile.

When the act went into effect in August, the D. U. R. refused to file rates under it, but proceeded to charge the fares previously in effect. The utilities commission requested the attorney general to file suit against the company. An injunction was issued in Ingham circuit court late in August compelling the D. U. R. to reduce its rates to the Glaspie act level.
