WATCH STEERING MECHANISM

Car Whose Direction Cannot Be Con-trolled is Dangerous-Make Fre-quent Inspections.

Don't opjet your steering mechan-isms. A car whose direction cannot be controlled is dangerous. While ad-justing mechanism it is best to turn wheels to extreme right. Parts are worn less at this position than when straight ahead. Never turn the steer-ing wheel while the car is standing still. This puts severe strata on all steering gour parts and is hard on trees. Careful drivers will inspect fre-quently.
