## FARMERS SUCCESS DUE TO DAIRYING

(Continued from last week.)

As in any line of business one of the surest ways of increasing profits is to lower the cost of production. No business lends itself to such a plan more admirably than does dairying. From a hit and miss system of feeding, farmers have been learning feed values and how to feed. They know that they can only expect to get out of a cow what they put into her and hence there are few cows today that are forced to make milk on a diet of marsh hay. The value of such legumes as clover, alfalfa, and soy beans is now generally recognized and dairymen are growing one or more of these crops to balance their rations. In this way they are able to get maximum production by buying a minimum of feed.

That there are differences in cows is now also widely known. Most farmers realize that it is better to have ten cows that will keep them than twice as many that they are obliged to keep. Boarder cows are going to the packers as soon as they are discovered. A keen, observing farmer can pick out the best producers of his herd.

All in all, then, dairying is becoming more and more a pleasant and remunerative type of farming. For the beginner there is no more acceptable time than the present to lay the foundation for a profitable herd. Foundation stock of good quality is as cheap today as it probably ever will be. There is everything in favor of starting or expanding the business now.
