\$24 NOW AVERAGE WEEKLY EARNING

DEPARTMENT OF LABOR REPORT
SAYS COST OF LIVING DROP.
PED 25 PER CENT.

STILL ABOVE PRE-WAR SCALE

But Wages and Living Costs Are More in Line With Average Normal Conditions.

Washington—The cost of living, which has fallen off nearly 25 per cent in Michigan and throughout the country in the last 15 months, is declining faster than wages, it is indicated in reports to the department of labor.

Twenty-four dollars per week is the average now being earned by workers in industrial plants. This is practically the same as a year ago, despite wage reductions in 1921. The actual figures are taken to indicate that wage reductions have affected a much smaller number of workers than was supposed.

The average weekly earning capacity is now approximately the same as a year ago for a majority of those employed in the following industries: Manufacture of automobiles, cotton, hosiery and underwear, men's clothing, leather, boots and shoes, paper and cigars.

This report is based on returns from a large number of plants in all sections of the country, and cannot be taken to apply to the earnings of workers in any single locality or establishment.

The reports show a material reduction, however, in the average earnings of workers in the iron and steel industry, in the building and repair of cars, and in the manufacture of silk. A year ago the average weekly earning capacity in these industries was \$32. The average is now \$24, or more in line with the earning capacity of workers in industry in general.

The indication that wage rates have been brought more in line with another in the principal industries is a process for which business men and economists have been waiting for many months.

Average earnings of workers in all lines are still very much above pre-war standards, the returns show, although radically lower than during the period when wages were at the peak.

HUGE ARMY FRAUDS ARE BARED

Hundreds of Thousands Reported Stolen by Officers in Charge.

New York—New army frauds involving several army officers and men of the army motor transport corps, whereby hundreds of thousands of dollars' worth of gasoline, tires, spare parts and motorcycles were stolen and sold, were uncovered during the roundup of witnesses for the court martial of Captain George R. Thompson, already under arrest for alleged frauds at the Brooklyn army base.

George W. Drake, formerly a lieutenant in the motor transport corps, is already under arrest, while a captain of infantry, whose name is concealed by federal agents who are now seeking him, is accused of shortage in his accounts.

MARY NO LONGER TO DIRECT

Announces Resignation As Leader of Grand Opera Company.

Chicago—Mary Garden has resigned as director of Chicago Grand Opera company. This action has been forecast for some time, but intimations that she would resign have always been met by denials from those in authority.

She arrived in Chicago 24 hours ahead of her company, went into an executive session with the financial backers of the opera and then issued a statement to the press announcing she had decided to lay aside her duties as artistic manager.

MANUFACTURERS MOVE WEST

Statement Points to Michigan's Big Increase of Output.

New York—In a statement issued Monday by the National Bank of Commerce, it is said that manufacturing industry is leaving the Atlantic seaboard for the Middle West. The growth of Michigan as a manufacturing state is pointed to. Michigan advanced from an output of \$320,000,000 in 1906 to \$3,466,000,000, an increase of over 10 times the output 20 years ago.

REPORT IRISH FACTIONS AGREED

Dublin Dispatch Says Basis for Peace Agreement Reached.

London—An agreement has been reached between the military leaders of the Republican and Free State forces in Ireland, says a dispatch from Dublin, which will constitute the basis for peaceful arrangements in connection with the future policy of both sides and profoundly influence events in southern Ireland for the better.

Satisfying Hard Putty.
Putty that has become hardened by exposure to an ardent window glass, may be softened and removed by the use of the following mixture: Shake 3 pounds quicklime in water and add one pound pearlash, making the whole about the consistency of paint. Apply to the putty on both sides of the glass and let it remain for about 12 hours. It should then be possible to lift the glass out without trouble.

Famous Irish Regiment.
Perhaps the oldest Irish regiment to have a continuous history is the Eighteenth Regiment of Foot, raised as Lord Forbes' Regiment, and brought to England by James II in 1688, when the monarch bled to collect Irish troops about him. Upon its colors it bears the harp of Ireland with the motto: "Virtutis Muremque Praestantem." or "The Guard for Valor at Namur." This honor was won in 1695 at Namur, when the regiment won also the title of "The Royal Irish Regiment."
