Farmington Couple Marks Sixty Years Of Marriage

Sixty years ago, in the tiny community of Springfield, Ont., Violet Parker became the bride of Harry Branon. This Sunday the couple will sit down to dinner with friends and relatives in their home at 2800 West 10 Mile, Farmington, to mark a half century plus a decade of married life. The actual wedding date was Dec. 29, 1909, and the minister who officiated was the Rev. J. C. Dunlop.

THE BRANONS lived in Aylmer, Ont., until 1920, when they moved to Detroit. There Mr. Branon was an employee of the Ford Motor Co. for 37 years, retiring and moving to Farmington in 1956.

The couple had two sons, Kenneth, who lives with his wife in Farmington, and Homer, who died in 1961, leaving a widow, Helen Branon of Dearborn.

daughter of the Kenneth Branon, is the couple's only grandchild. She is living in Hawaii while her U.S. Navy officer husband is stationed there.

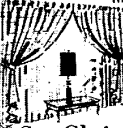

Try this for a quick supper. Steamed rice, perfectly browned link sausages and curried peaches. Combine one-half cup peach syrup with two tablespoons butter and one teaspoon curry powder. Heat the peach slices in syrup and serve over the hot rice.

Don't Mix Up Hamburger, Ground Beef

Hamburger is hamburger, but ground beef is something else.

That's not a catchy slogan designed to get you to eat ground beef, it's the law. Hamburger and ground beef are close cousins, but they aren't the same thing, according to B. Dale Ball, director of the Michigan Department of Agriculture.

Ball's department administers Michigan's strict laws on comminuted meats, including hamburger and ground beef. "The law says the maximum amount of fat in hamburger is 30% and in ground beef, 20%," he said.

THE MDA has enforced the law on violators whose products don't meet standards. Both hamburger and ground beef must be made from skeletal meat only - no livers, lungs or hearts.
