## USE BULLITS TO BREAK MUTINY

POLICE SHOOT DOWN 11 PRISONERS IN SOUTH CAROLINA PENITENTIARY.

## PRISONERS DEFY AUTHORITIES

Because Sullen Who Ordered to Turn in Civilian Clothes and Refuse to Go to Work.

Columbia, S. C.—A mutiny of 150 convicts in the state penitentiary Monday was put down after 11 mutineers had been wounded by pentitentiary guards and city police, two of whom being perhaps fatally shot.

An attempt by convicts to burn the chair factory failed.

The outbreak came after the dinner hour. The prisoners were sullen, it is said, because they had been ordered to turn in what civilian clothes and other articles they had which were not needed by them in prison. Through certain apparent leaders they defied the authorities and announced they would not return to work. Aid was asked of city authorities, by telephone.

No effort was made to coerce the prisoners pending arrival of reinforcements from the city. In the meantime the mutineers stood in the penitentiary yard, armed with sticks and knives obtained from the chair factory.

Upon arrival of the detachment of city police the mob of prisoners surged toward the little group of blue-coated officers, cursing and snarling threats. A volley of riot guns met them and 11 men dropped. The remainder broke and tried to run. They were rounded up without further trouble.

## THREE DRY AGENTS SUSPENDED

Enforcement Chief and Two Aids Asked to Turn in Badges.

Detroit—George A. Zahm, acting group chief of the prohibition enforcement department of Michigan, and two of his assistants, James T. Coleman and Charles M. Cutliffe, were Monday suspended from service by James R. Davis, federal prohibition chief here, following an investigation of their activities by Patrick Roche, special intelligence agent from Washington.

The orders of suspension, received by Royal A. Decker, deputy prohibition director for Michigan, from his chief, James R. Davis, read: "Per instructions received from Special Intelligence Agent, Patrick T. Roche and James R. Davis, federal prohibition director, you are suspended from duties as federal agent Monday, pending investigation now in progress."

Zahm and Coleman were "veterans" on the force, each having served two and one-half years. Cutliffe had been on the job three months.

## U. S. CANNOT RECOGNIZE MEXICO

Obregon Regime; First Must Restore American Property There.

Washington—With unusual emphasis it was made clear Monday United States camp and will not recognize the Obregon government or any other administration in Mexico until that administration guarantees property of American citizens will not be confiscated under provisions of the Carranza constitution of 1917. That is the substance of the American policy, and it was stated explicitly and with force that until these guarantees are forthcoming Mexico must remain one of those nations with which the American government can have no official relations.

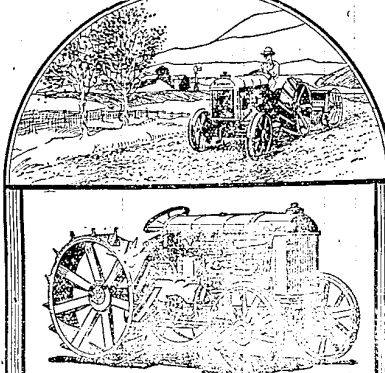
## DODGE OFFERS JOB BY FORD
