goods for the farmer's eggs, poultry,  
butter or other produce. They  
don't trust a penny's worth, but  
make you pay cash before you get  
the goods, or if they do not suit,  
they will not exchange them for  
you. They pay no taxes in your  
city or county treasury—with  
which our schools are maintained;  
roads, bridges, and sidewalks are  
built. They do not contribute to  
our churches or charitable insti-  
tutions, nor to our poor.

Oakland County Seeks

Congressional Honors  
Mayor Thaddeus D. Seeley of  
Pontiac, is starting his active  
campaign for the republican nomi-  
nation for Congress in the Sixth  
district.

Mr. Seeley is a native of Oak-  
land county, fifty-four years of  
age and a successful business man.  
The foundation of his successful  
career was begun on the farm  
where he spent the first forty  
years of his life, starting out  
himself on a rented farm when he  
was twenty-one years old. During  
the later years of his farm life,  
he did a large business in the  
handling of live stock and he also  
found time to serve his district for  
two terms in the state house of  
representatives and two terms in  
the state senate.

Since taking up his residence in  
Pontiac, Mr. Seeley has been en-  
gaged in the development of real  
estate in the city and country and  
the management of his two farms.  
He has been a director in the Pon-  
tiac Commercial & Savings Bank  
for several years.

Mr. Seeley is serving his second  
terms as mayor of his home city  
he has been first elected in the  
fall of 1920 following the adoption  
of the new commission-manager  
charter.

Farmers Busy on Rail Problems.

Michigan farmers are to be in-  
creasingly active in railroad trans-  
portation matters, according to  
action taken last week by the  
state farm bureau when it retained  
E. L. Ewing, prominent Michi-  
gan traffic attorney, of Grand  
Rapids, to represent the bureau on  
rate and service matters before  
state and federal railroad com-  
missions and before railroad com-  
mittees.

Mr. Ewing directed the Michi-  
gan Traffic League's rail rate re-  
duction cause which is still before  
the state and federal railroad com-  
mission representatives at Lansing  
for the railroad's side of the  
case. The shipper closed their  
case May 18, presenting strong  
testimony to show that Michigan  
freight rates are too high and that  
the Michigan zoning system is dis-  
criminatory upon Michigan ship-  
pers because it puts them at a dis-  
advantage with respect to com-  
peting shippers in adjoining states.

The state farm bureau inter-  
vened in behalf of agricultural  
interests. Agricultural evidence pre-  
sented by the League was said  
to be the most complete and con-  
vincing testimony ever presented  
at a Michigan rate hearing. Forty  
farmers and farmers' representa-  
tives, coming from nearly as many  
counties, were heard by the Michi-  
gan Public Utilities Commission  
and representatives of the Inter-  
state Commerce Commission.

LAUDS HOSPITAL  
IN BATTLE CREEK

Legion Commander Says Attacks  
Are Without Foundation.

Detroit—"No man who attacks the  
American Legion's hospital at Battle  
Creek is fit to be a Legionnaire," Paul  
A. Martin, state commander of the  
Legion, told members of Charles A.  
Learner post here.

"Attacks such as have been made  
recently are absolutely without founda-  
tion. All that those in charge ask  
is that you come and see for your-  
selves."

pital. It is a home for the ex-service  
man making the hard journey back  
to health."

EFFECT OF POISON  
GAS IMPAIRS VOICE

Stricken Veterans Urged to Have  
Throats Examined.

Washington—Poison gas inhaled by  
American soldiers in France is be-  
ginning to show its effects by caus-  
ing service men to lose their voices.  
The bureau has asked the American Le-  
gion to inform its members whose  
ability to speak is becoming impaired  
to report to the nearest Bureau physi-  
cian for examination. American  
Legion posts will give information as  
to where these men may be found.

The Bureau states that a large num-  
ber of young veterans have recently  
been found suffering from tumors of  
the vocal cords, apparently in their  
infancy. The growth prevents vi-  
bration of the cords, due to pressure,  
and thus affects the voice.

The Legion is asked to get service men  
suffering from a growing inability to  
speak to the nearest Veterans Bureau  
doctor for prompt examination. In  
the case warrants, the Bureau an-  
nounces, the former soldiers will be  
sent West for operations.

PLAN FOR REMOVING  
GREASE FROM AUTOS

Easily Built Hot-Water Bath Is  
Quite Effective.

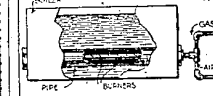
Few Minutes' Boiling Removes All  
Particles and Leaves Clean Sur-  
face That Can Be Soldered  
or Otherwise Mended.

"Not broiled—boiled!" exclaimed  
the repair-shop manager.

"Oh, I thought you said broiled,"  
replied the visitor. "Even so, I think  
they would make tough eating."

The manager gave a sign of de-  
spair, and then went on to explain  
the merits of the new boiler, into  
which parts of an automobile are  
thrown for the purpose of removing  
the grease. The illustration gives a  
general idea of the construction.

A 4-inch pipe leads into the boiler,  
and is surrounded with the water.



An Easily Constructed Hot-Water Bath  
for Removing Grease From Auto-  
mobile Parts.

Inside this pipe is a gas-burner of  
any suitable make, the flame from  
which plays against the interior of  
the piping and raises the water to the  
boiling temperature. A good washing  
powder is sometimes added to the wa-  
ter and aids in the cleaning.

Parts of an automobile can be re-  
paired more effectively when clean,  
and no better method for the cleaning  
is found than simply immersing in the  
hot-water bath. A few minutes' boil-  
ing removes all particles of grease,  
and leaves a clean surface that can  
be soldered or otherwise mended. Not  
only the surfaces but the interior of  
parts are thoroughly cleansed by this  
boiling process.—H. C. Ridgely in  
Popular Science Monthly.

WHEEL ALIGNMENT IS  
OF MUCH IMPORTANCE

Tire Injury Caused by Wheels  
Out of True.

First Symptom of Something Wrong  
Is Rapid Wear of Center of  
Tread—Tubes and Cords Re-  
ceive Careful Tests.

The time is at hand when car owners  
give their cars a thorough overhau-  
ling in preparation for summer use.  
The attention required for tires in  
this spring renovation is very limited  
and simple.

One of the first and most important  
is to get the front wheels into proper  
alignment. Bad alignment is one of  
the principal causes of tire injury. The  
first symptom of misalignment is rapid  
wear in the center of the tread. Ex-  
amination of the alignment should in-  
clude an investigation to see that there  
are no loose bearings, for a loose bear-  
ing means a wobbling wheel.

Examine the castings of tires for  
cuts. If cuts are filled with heat-  
set dough the cuts will not grow big-  
ger.

Tubes should receive special atten-  
tion, for once they have been placed in-  
side the casing they are forgotten.  
Test the tubes for low leaks. Put  
new plungers in the valves, even if the  
old ones appear satisfactory. The rubber  
washers in the plug become stiff  
and hard after a time, and it is good  
policy to change the valves at least once  
a year.

The pump should be tested, especial-  
ly the rubber tubing and the connec-  
tions. If the latter or piston head in  
your hand pump is dried up it may  
be softened by a liberal application of  
vasoline. If it is gone beyond help you  
can get a new leather at a supply  
store. The same rule applies to the in-  
spection of a mechanical pump attached to  
the engine. See that the pump is well  
oiled, especially in the cylinder, but  
avoid excess oil, as it may find its way  
into the inner hose.

CRACKS IN HOOD FINISH



The cause of cracks in the hood  
finish is the uneven expansion of the  
metal and paint due to the engine's  
heat. To avoid this line the hood  
with asbestos paper, using shellac to  
hold the paper to the metal.

To eradicate these cracks in the car, try  
loosening the body to the chassis and  
oil to all parts where the body of the car  
touches the frame, then tightening the  
bolts.
