Miss Katherine Sprague attended commencement exercises at Ann Arbor last week and listened to an address by Secretary of State, Hughes.

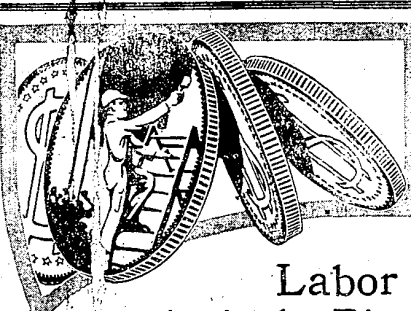
