TEACHING CHICKS TO ROOST

Difficult to Keep Young Fowls Clean When Permitted to Remain on the Floor:

It is often advisable to teach the chicks to roost when 8 to 12 weeks of age, say poultry specialists of the United States Department of Agriculture. When they are allowed by remain on the floor, it is difficult to keep them clean and to keep them from crowding. If wide robotts—3 to 4 inches—are used, there is but little. If any, more faunce of crooked breasts than 1't the chicks are allowed to remain on the door.
