**Named to Supervise
Fair Running Races**

Of interest to racing followers throughout Michigan is the announcement by G. W. Dickinson, secretary-manager of the Michigan State Fair, that W. J. "Bill" Dowling, of Owosso, will have charge of the six-day running race meet scheduled for this year's exposition, Detroit, September 1 to 10.

Mr. Dowling has had wide experience in the running horse world and has supervised the races at Bay City, Jackson, Adrian and Grand Rapids fairs in recent years. He is making elaborate preparations for the State Fair meet which will open September 4 and run through the 10th.

The important event of the meeting will be the State Fair Derby, slated for Labor Day. A purse of \$1,000 will go to the winner. Purses for the entire meeting will exceed \$16,000.
