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POLITICAL DOPE
A Lansing political dopest figures out the situation in the sixth congressional district in this way:
In the congressional districts Congressmen Michener of the Second, Ketcham of the Fourth and Woodruff of the Tenth are unopposed. In all the other districts the nominations are contested. There will be hot fights in the First, Sixth, Eighth and Ninth and Thirtieth. The first and last districts just named must choose new men, as must the Sixth and Eighth. In the Sixth district it was thought Thad Seelye of Pontiac might not file. Indeed, he did not file until the dying hours of the last day. The opinion is held by some that if Seelye and Blackney both stay in Grant Hudson's nomination will be assured, but that is by no means certain. The chances are Seelye will draw just as many votes from Hudson as he will from Blackney, perhaps more. Just the same, it seems a pity for a high grade man like Seelye to sacrifice himself in this kind of scrap. Perhaps in all that goes to make the right kind of congressman, Seelye is the choice of the field, but he seems to lack Blackney's punch and pep as an aggressive campaigner. To those of us who do not want to see the Sixth district represented at Washington by weak and clumsy mediocrity, either of these candidates is acceptable.

MORE TRAFFIC OFFICERS NEEDED
Without the immediate presence of traffic officers to enforce them, rules, regulations and warning notices have but little effect in lessening the dangers of travel on the streets and highways of the state. An army of traffic officers will prove costly, but it seems as though the state, counties and municipalities will be forced to that expedient in order to reduce the number of accidents to the minimum. Statistics show that in the congested districts in cities where traffic officers are stationed, travel is much safer than in outlying districts where there are but few officers. In Detroit so far this year 99 persons have been killed in auto accidents, which is 23 more than were killed during the entire year of 1921. But the comparatively few of the serious accidents occurred in the congested districts.

"One hundred per cent officials are assured only where 100 per cent citizens stand back of them," says Martha E. Lockwood, secretary of the Oakland County Law Enforcement League. Before criticizing officials it might be well for all of us to take a few moments for introspection in order to ascertain how near we come to hitting the 100 per cent mark.
It is announced that the state tax levy will be about \$3,000,000 less this year than last. Whether this sizable reduction is due to an economical administration of state affairs or to political expediency, it being an election year, we are unable to state. Both probably, are contributing causes.

GRANT HUDSON'S CAREER OFFERS MANY CONTRASTS.
Congressional Candidate Has Had Experience in Business, Farming and Public Affairs
Grant M. Hudson, candidate for the republican nomination for Congress from this district, was born on a farm in Ohio in 1868. Part of his boyhood was spent in Lansing, Mich., with his uncle, Martin Hudson, proprietor of the old Hudson House.
As a young man, he learned the painter's trade, and it was while following his trade that he first came to realize the advantages of a higher education. Determined to realize his ambition along this purpose of reviewing the registration line, he worked his way through the Kalamazoo college, graduating in 1894, and then entered the University of Chicago for his Master's degree.
Because of ill-health, he was obliged to discontinue his college work and took up farming in the Kalamazoo county. In 1897 he same township.
He entered the mercantile field at Schoolcraft, Mich., in a small way, the business prospered and develop-

ing to a point where it was the largest mercantile establishment in that section.
While he was in Schoolcraft, Mr. Hudson was a member of the school board, member of the council and president of the village three terms, and represented his county in the state legislature during the sessions of 1905 and 1907, as well as the special session of 1908.
In the legislature, he was father of what was then widely known as the Hudson Local Option bill. He also took an active part in the adoption of the bills providing for a two cent railroad fare and for direct primary elections.
In 1910, Mr. Hudson became superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League, and in 1914 became state superintendent when the headquarters were removed to Lansing. The adoption of the state-wide constitutional dry amendment was accomplished under his leadership and direction.
He resigned from the superintendency of the Anti-Saloon League in 1919, and was appointed by Governor Sleeper a member of the state Industrial Accident commission. He served the state in that capacity until the summer of 1920, when he became general director of the Michigan Baptist convention. This position calls for a large amount of executive ability, and places him in active control of the extensive property holdings of the Baptist denomination throughout the entire state.
Since Mr. Hudson sold out his mercantile business, he has been actively interested in agricultural problems. He is thoroughly familiar with all phases of farming and farm management, as he has continuously operated a farm for many years, his holdings now comprising 30 acres.
Mr. Hudson has always been interested in educational matters, and holds an honorary degree from Hillsdale college. He is a trustee of both Kalamazoo and Hillsdale colleges, and was for some time on the board of control of the state school for the blind. While in the legislature he was especially active in behalf of the Industrial School for Boys, and took a leading part in the establishment of the Western State Normal.
This spring, his home community, the city of East Lansing, elected him member of the council, and it has paid him an unparalleled tribute in recent weeks in that every republican voter who could ever be reached with but two exceptions, signed the Hudson congressional nominating petitions.
Mr. Hudson is a typical self-made American citizen, who has achieved success through hard work and public office through recognized public service. His wide experience in business, farming and public affairs admirably fit him for membership in Congress as representative from the sixth district.

TO THE REPUBLICAN ELECTORS OF OAKLAND COUNTY
The friends of Leonard R. Schnell take pleasure in presenting to the Republican Electors of Oakland County his name as a candidate for the office of Sheriff of Oakland County at the Primary this coming fall. Believing if he

he is nominated and elected for this office Mr. Schnell will fill the position with credit to himself and for the good of the entire county of Oakland.
Mr. Schnell was born on June 21st, 1880, and has lived in Oakland County all his life. At the present, he is living in the village of Berneade, Royal Oak Township.
Mr. Schnell has never held any public elective office and no official position except that of Deputy Sheriff, to which he was appointed by present Sheriff Butler on January 1st, 1921. Mr. Schnell was actively engaged in the duties of the office of Deputy Sheriff from that time until September 16th, 1921, and during the time he was in the Sheriff's Office, was active in a number of important cases, particularly that arising out of a robbery committed in Livingston County by the Conti Gang. It

was while in pursuit of this gang of bandits, at which time Schnell was in the western part of Oakland County, on the 25th of September, 1921, that Mr. Schnell was shot in a fight with these bandits, a wound which he sustained a broken arm and minor wounds which kept him from active duty for a period of some three months. The four men, who survived the battle were afterward convicted in Livingston County, and sentenced to long terms in prison.
Shortly after resuming his duties again, Mr. Schnell was shot once more upon the 16th of September, by Tony Yarrick and Edward Wiseman, two gunmen from Detroit, who are at the present time serving long sentences in Marquette and Jackson prisons. On this occasion Mr. Schnell was in the hospital for a period of thirty days, during a part of which time it was an open question whether or not he would live or die.
During the time Mr. Schnell was actively engaged in the office of Deputy Sheriff, he was one of those deputies who worked on salary, but since December 1st, 1921, Mr. Schnell has not been actively engaged in the duties of the office and has not since such time received any compensation from Oakland County.
In presenting Mr. Schnell's name to the Electors of Oakland County for their consideration, the parties who know him best feel that he is worthy of the office which he seeks and if nominated and elected thereto, he will merit a staff of which Oakland County can be proud. He is not a candidate of any faction either political or otherwise, and he is simply standing upon a platform of fair and equal enforcement of all the laws and a square deal for all.
