CONVICT LABOR ON ROAD WORK

One of the biggest jobs yet handled in Oakland county is the repairing of Saginaw turnpike, says the Rochester Era.

This road had been used as an experimental strip, with several sorts of surface pavement laid on the old gravel bed. The top coating did not stand up under heavy pounding of truck traffic, and went to pieces this spring in many places.

Its replacement was put up to the jail labor crew and a camp wagon was sent out, housing 12 men. Additional men were taken to and from the job each day by automobile from the jail, and the repairs are proceeding speedily.

The road wagon is provided with bunks for the laborers, who work under guard. They have their own cook, and after the first strain of getting accustomed to the hard work, the men seem to prefer it to staying behind the bars to serve out their 15- to 65-day terms. They are enabled to be out-of-doors all day, and come back after doing their stunt on the roads, looking much better in health and physique than when they left.

As a cure for the after effects of too much moonshine, the jail road gang has been found to work wonders, and the prisoners come back with the alcohol well sweated out of their system.
